DORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 22.- (By International News.)-Larry Bevan, official mouthpiece for Waite high school's football team, was on his way home to Toledo last night with his team. He leaves behind him in Portland thousands of football fans who are thoroughly peeved over his actions which resulted in the cancellation of the Waite-Lincoln high school Final practice for the University of game, scheduled Saturday here on Multnomah field.

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Refused To Play.

Friday night Bevan absolutely declared Waite high school would not play on the ice-covered field. Officials of the Multnomah club agreed to remove all ice and snow from the field and recover it with a new layer of sawdust. Bevan said the offer was too late—he had made up his mind not to play and that ended it.
