Typhoid, Diabetes Take Less Toll In : 1923 Than In 1922

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22,-(By Associated Press) .- Death rates from typhoid fever and diabetes in the nation's registration area decreased in 1923, according to figures made in 1923, according to figures made public today by the census bureau. Deaths from typhold fever in 1923 totalied 6,635, or 6:8 for 100,000 of population, while the figure for 1922 was 6,981, or 7.5 for each 100,000 population. The death toll from diabetes in 1923 was 17,857, or 17.9 for each 100,000 of population, against a 1922 figure of 17,182, and a rate per 100,000 of 184.

The registration area covered in the figures embraces approximately 88 per cent of the population of the country.

58 per cent of the population of the country.
Of thirty-four states for which "adjusted" rates were reported for: 1922 and 1923, ten showed lower rates of disbetic deaths last year. New York had the highest adjusted rate, 24 per 160,000 of population, and Mississippi the lowest, 7.2 per 100,000.

eports.
Of twenty-five states showing ad-Of twenty-five states shewing ad-justed typhoid rates, Colorado had the highest in 1923 or 18.7 per 100, 000 of population, while Rhode.
