

# Kohawk Coaches Map Out Football and Track Schedules at Mid-west Meet

## FOUR OF COE'S SEVEN GAMES BOOKED FOR FOREIGN FIELDS

Dubuque, Knox And Cornell Billed To Play On Local Gridiron; Milliken Dropped From Mid-west Conference.

HAVING completed their respective schedules for the 1925 season Coaches Moray Eby and George W Bryant returned to the city last night after spending yesterday in attendance at the semi-annual meeting of the Mid-west conference at Hotel La Salle in Chicago.

Drawing up of Coe's grid card and completing the track schedule for next spring formed the most important task for the Kohawk mentors at the conference. Aside from schedule making nothing much of importance took place at the conference with the exception of Milliken's being dropped and the decision to continue baseball if enough institutions would support it. Coe's early schedule announced this morning by Coach Eby will include seven games, six of them with Mid-west institutions. Dubuque which probably will come here 10 will complete the card. Only three home games were carded and Coe will play four conference contests on foreign fields next fall.

### CALIFORNIA BOXING COMMISSION NAMED

Responsible Men To Have Charge Of Ring Affairs In Western State.

SACRAMENTO Calif., Dec. 23.—(By Associated Press)—Governor Richardson yesterday announced his selections for the state boxing commission provided for by the adoption of the voters of amendment No. 7 at the November election. The governor named William M. Hamilton, Sacramento hotelman, Capt. Seth W. Strellinger of the Hollywood post of the American Legion and Louis Almgren, fire chief of San Diego. The governor in a statement announcing the commission said: "In these three men I feel I have selected a commission which will maintain the new law in spirit and letter and will keep the alleged fighting game up as high a plane as is humanly possible. If there is a fall ure the people can blame the law and repeat it, but they will not be able to blame the commission. Having done my full duty I wish my hands of the whole affair and leave the commission to carry out the will of the people as expressed at the polls."

### Former Nebraska Star Is Offered Brazilian Post

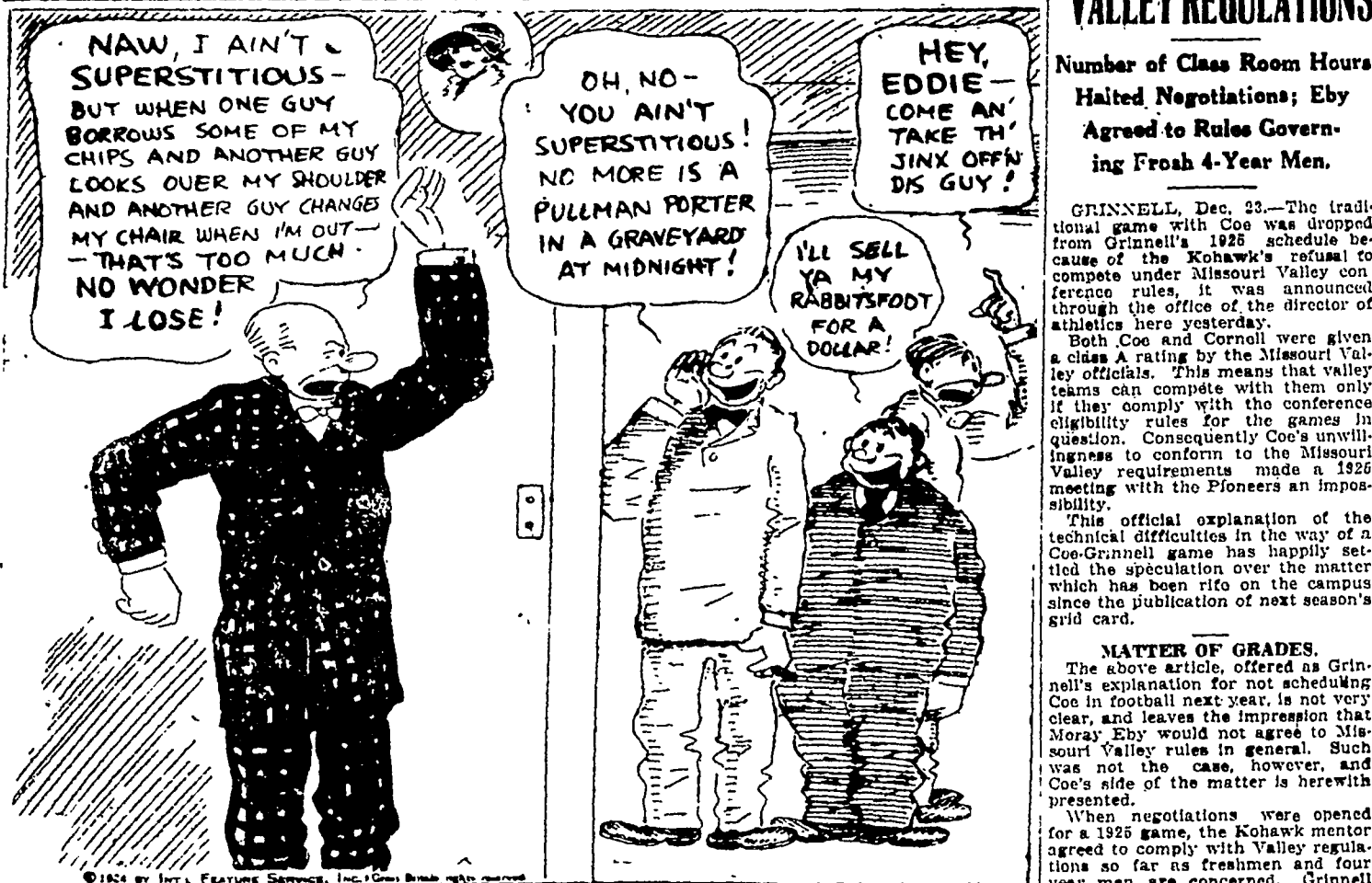

# NURMI SHOWS GOOD FORM IN TRAINING FOR JANUARY MEET

Will Not Return Home as Contemplated Last Week; To Meet Ray In Special One-Mile And Ritola In 5,000 Meter Race.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(By International News.)—Athletic experts expressed themselves today as being impressed with the recent trials shown by Paave Nurmi, great Finnish runner. Nurmi was dissatisfied with his efforts to run indoors and hardly more than a week ago was talking of returning to his native land without so much as setting foot on an American track in a race.

He will meet a select field in a special mile at the Finnish-American A. C. games on January 6, and later in the evening will go to the mark against Willie Ritola and others in a 5,000 meter race. His work to date has been confined to Van Cortlandt park and to brief quarters on a local armory floor. No announcement has been made of the times made by Nurmi in his trials.

Jole Ray To Run. Among others it is expected that Jole Ray will pit his stride against the great Finn in the January meet. Ray is reported to be making rapid progress in training and expresses the hope that he will be in good condition when the proper time arrives. Ray undoubtedly will elect to compete in the one-mile event, at which distance he is regarded as having a better chance than in the longer race. The Chicago taxi driver did not show his best form last year, but is hopeful of staging a successful comeback. Unless he succeeds in this endeavor he will have no business on the same track with Nurmi as the latter's time for the mile is much faster than Jole's even with the western runner at his best.

### MATTER OF MISSOURI VALLEY REGULATIONS

Number of Class Room Hours Halted Negotiations; Eby Agreed to Rules Governing Frosh 4-Year Men.

GRINNELL, Dec. 23.—The traditional game with Coe was dropped from Grinnell's 1925 schedule because of the Kohawk's refusal to concede under Missouri Valley conference rules. It was announced through the office of the director of athletics here yesterday. Both Coe and Grinnell were given a class A rating by the Missouri Valley officials. This means that valley teams can compete with them only if they comply with the conference eligibility rules for the games in question. Consequently Coe's unwillingness to conform to the Missouri Valley requirements made a 1925 meeting with the Pioneers an impossibility. An official explanation of the technical difficulties in the way of a Coe-Grinnell game has happily settled the speculation over the matter which has been afloat since the publication of next season's grid card.

### MATTER OF GRADES

The above matter, the Kohawk mentors' explanation for not scheduling Coe in football next year, is not very clear, and leaves the impression that Moray Eby would not agree to Missouri Valley rules in general. Such was not the case, however, and Coe's side of the matter is herewith presented.

When negotiations were opened for a 1925 game, the Kohawk mentors agreed to comply with Valley regulations so far as freshmen and four year men are concerned. Grinnell officials then pointed out that the Valley conference requires a minimum of twenty-five hours of class room work each week whereas the Mid-west conference regulations require only twelve hours.

When the Pioneer authorities got down to such technicalities, Eby would no longer agree and negotiations were dropped. Ames, it is understood, was willing to schedule Coe under the conditions and a game between the Grinnell and Cyclones was on the fire until Wisconsin booked Sam Williamson's state eleven.

### TWO PENN GRIDMEN STARS ARE INJURED

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 23.—(By Associated Press)—Pennsylvania's hopes of defeating the University of California on the gridiron at Berkeley, New Year's day received another setback yesterday with the announcement that Ted Fairchild, veteran right end of the Red and Blue eleven, had been suddenly stricken with appendicitis and probably would be unable to play. With Clark Craig definitely lost to the team because of an injury received in the Thanksgiving day contest with Cornell, Fairchild's illness came as a shock to coaches and players alike. Craig and Fairchild were considered two of Pennsylvania's best linemen and the loss of both would be a hard blow.

### EVERETT SCOTT IS WORRYING H GIGGS

Ward May Be Shifted Over To Short To Replace Slipping Veteran.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Manager Miller Huggins of the Yanks frankly admits that shortstop is his greatest worry. While the veteran Everett Scott still handles every drive that he can reach in his usual flawless style, he has slowed up a couple of steps in the field. Many balls that got by him last season as base hits would have been easy outs ten years back. Scott can't go on forever and no one realizes it better than Huggins. Should the Yanks be unable to get a man to replace Scott, it is possible that Second Baseman Ward will be shifted to that position. It is also possible that Scott might be used to advantage at second shortstop. "Bub" Maraville, who held second base last season, was one of the most valuable players in the league at that position. Only the fact that Ward is not keen for playing short much preferring second has kept Huggins from trying out the scheme.

### BANTAM TITLE SWITCHES OFTEN

MORE BANTAMWEIGHT title shifts have occurred in recent years than any other boxing division. Eddie Cannonball Martin, 21 years old, is the sixth 115 pound title holder since 1914. Kid Williams ruled until 1916 after which Pete Tierman, Joe Lynch and Johnny Buff took turns occupying the throne.

LA FAYETTE LOSES eight of its 1924 gridiron stars by graduation including Capt. Berry, named as all-eastern end by many critics. Bud Hanks also included in number of graduates. Chicago's field ace Crate and Brown, two other line men will be missing next fall.

UNUSUAL RELIANCE is being placed on pitchers by major league clubs fortifying themselves for the 1925 campaign. Connie Mack parted with \$100,000 for Lefty Grove, Baltimore mound star. Washington has acquired three veteran twirlers (Coveleski, Ruetter and Gregg, while the New York Yankees to obtain Urban Shocker handed over Joe Bush, veteran baseman and two young pitchers to St. Louis.

MACK FIGURES that with the addition of Grove, the long task of rebuilding the Athletics is about to bear fruit. The tall tutor sees visions of a pennant in 1925 and 1926. The Mack men have made threatening gestures for the past two seasons, but now loom as real contenders.
