

# RIN-TIN-TIN DOES HIS STUFF AT ISIS

Foils Rum Runners In "The Lighthouse By The Sea"; Play Teems With Adventure And Romance.

A dog's friendship, a man's loyalty to trust courage, fortitude—all the admirable virtues of both man and beast, are depicted in "The Lighthouse by the Sea" with Rin-tin-tin, the famous German police dog, the feature picture this week at the Isis. It was just a year ago this fall, that Rin-tin-tin "in person" performed in Cedar Rapids.

If the picture preaches a sermon, it does so indirectly. To the spectator, it is just a thrilling narrative, with many movements of breathtaking suspense and with glimpses of the sea and the rocky coast so real that the sound of the breakers almost becomes audible as the story unfolds.

It deals with the problems of rum runners on the Atlantic seaboard, and the way it has been met by United States coast guard cutters. But the more personal element is introduced in the romance of the aged lighthouse keeper his daughter, the young man ashore from a wreck—and the dog.

Caleb Hale has kept the light in the lighthouse tower glowing for 35 years. Now he has gone blind. Fearful lest if that fact becomes known, he will be removed from his post, and from the light he loves, he has cut himself off from human contact, while his pretty daughter helps him tend the light.

The wonders performed by Rin-tin-tin the dog with the human intelligence almost defy belief. He frustrates the attempts of the liquor dealers to put out the light in the tower. He himself carries a blazing bit of waste up the long winding stairway to set the light glowing. He scales a wall he releases his master from ropes that have bound him; he whips "The Yukon Killer," a ferocious bulldog, he many times saves the lives of his friends.

## SHELLSBURG WOMEN GET MARKERS FOR DEAD VETS

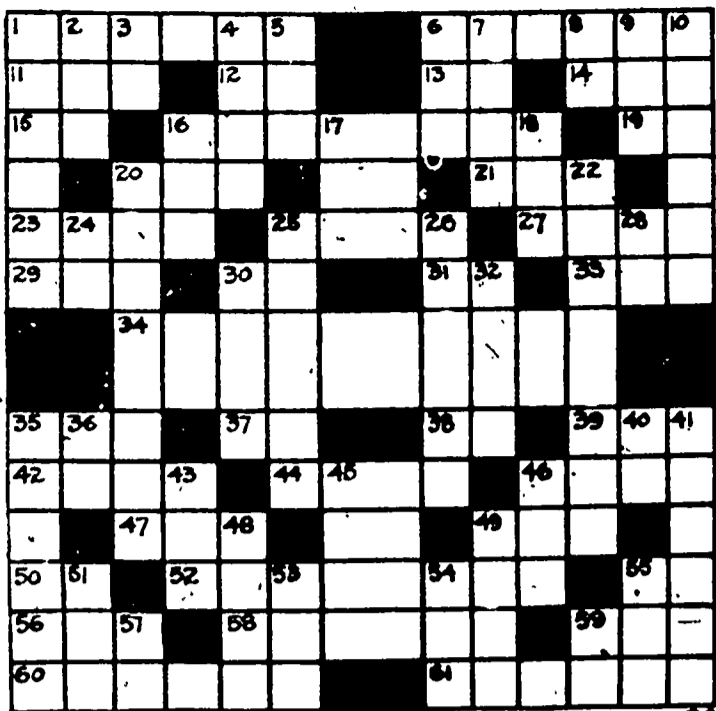

The stones arrived here a few days ago.

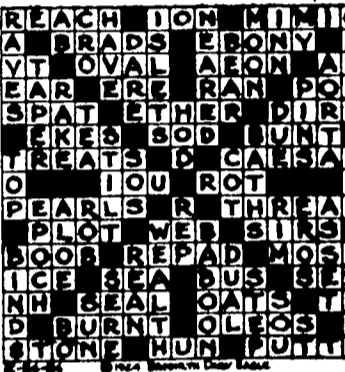

## Rail Board Refuses To Set Aside Wage Agreement Of S. P.

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—(By Associated Press).—Petitions of the conference committee of managers of western railroads to have the United States railroad labor board suspend operation of an agreement between the Southern Pacific company and its engineers and firemen, have been denied by the board.

The western managers asked that the agreement to set aside under a provision of the transportation act, giving the board power to do so if a wage or salary increase is likely to increase the rates of the carrier. The managers did not claim that an increase in rates was expected on the Southern Pacific but made plain that western roads who made similar wage increases might increase rates. The board declared the carriers have misinterpreted the law in assuming that it had authority to suspend an agreement affecting a carrier, because of the similar increase, extended to a second carrier might produce a rate increase for the second carrier.

SIoux CITY.—A series of raids in Ida county participated in by forty-one law enforcement officers, netted a truck load of alcohol and a number of gambling devices.
