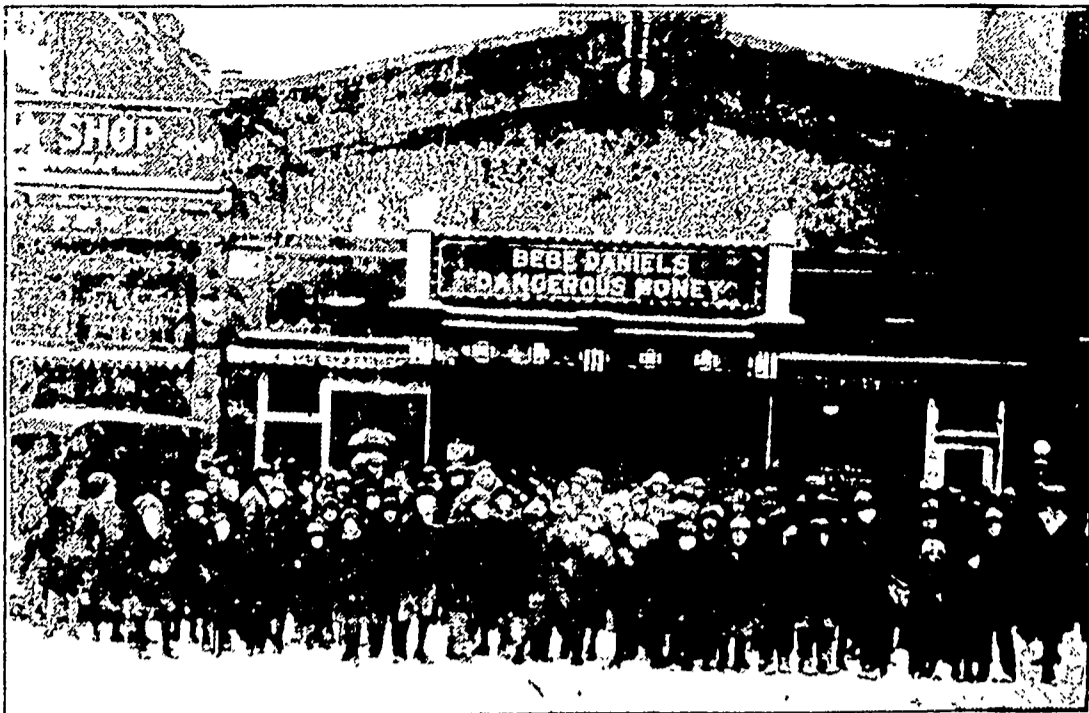

SEAPLANE SWAMPS, 4 PERSONS KILLED

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 24. - (By Associated Press) - Damage suffered in a previous take-off in rough seas is believed to have caused the swamping of a naval ambulance seaplane at the Hampton Roads naval air station yesterday, which resulted in the death of three naval men and a civilian. An official inquiry was ordered by the naval authorities today to determine the cause of the accident which befell the plane on descending to the water after returning with a hospital patient from the North Carolina coast. The patient, Andrew Williams of Buchanan, N. C., who was suffering from pneumonia, was one of those who met death. The others were E. M. Keyser and A. S. Mainwaring, chief petty officers and P. S. Gavin, a hospital apprentice. All four bodies were recovered. Two of the victims were struck by

the propellers as they attempted to get clear of the plane. The others were drowned. Three occupants of the plane, including Lieut. W. Gwyn, the pilot, escaped. The seaplane was said to have had a hole stove in her tail in rising in rough seas off the coast for the return flight. In order to keep water from rushing in through the hole on descending the tail was held up as high as possible, it was said, and this appears to have resulted in the swamping of the forward structure. It was the first serious accident in connection with the aerial hospital service since it was started more than a year ago. ST. PAUL'S BOY CHOIR TO SING AT CEDAR FALLS. Cedar Falls folk will hear the St. Paul's Methodist boys' choir next Sunday night. The choir, directed by Mrs. L. B. Grabau, will give the evening service at the First Methodist church of Cedar Falls. There are eighteen members of the choir, and with the parents and friends, a party of about fifty is expected to make the trip up-state Sunday afternoon. Among those who will go, are the Rev. A. M. Jayne, pastor, A. L. Case, director of boys' work, Mrs. Grabau and little Martha Joy Mason, who will contribute a solo to the choir program. The choir has sung at the Kenwood Park Methodist church and at Trinity Methodist here, besides singing regularly at St. Paul's. The candle light procession will be used for the Cedar Falls service. The cards they sang last Sunday at their own church, and other sacred numbers, will be offered by the boys. Theodore Vesely, a member of the choir, will play a trombone solo as an added feature.
