HOLIDAY COOKIES.
SOUR CREAM DROP COOKIES.
Cream one-third cup of shortening, add one-half cup of granulated sugar gradually. Then add two eggs well beaten and one teaspoon of vanilla. Dissolve one-fourth teaspoon of soda in one-half cup of sour cream and add to the first mixture. Sift one cup of flour and one-half cup of flour sifted with one-fourth teaspoon of salt and four teaspoons of baking powder. Then add one-half cup of raisins and one-half cup of nut pieces and mix. Drop by spoonfuls on a buttered sheet and bake in a moderate oven. Two cups of chopped peanuts may be added if desired.

CHOCOLATE DROP COOKIES.
Cream one-half cup of butter, add one cup of sugar gradually, while beating constantly, then add two eggs well beaten, two squares of melted chocolate, one-third cup of chopped walnuts, one-third cup of raisins cut in small pieces, one-half cup of flour, drop from the spoon on a greased sheet and bake one-fourth teaspoon of salt, one-fourth teaspoon of vanilla and two-thirds cup of flour. Drop from the spoon on a greased sheet and bake in a moderate oven.

SOFT MOLASSES COOKIES.
Work one-half cup of shortening and one-half cup of brown sugar together until creamy, add with one cup of molasses, one egg well beaten, one-half cup of sour cream mixed with one-half tablespoon of soda, one table-spoon of salt, one tablespoon of ginger and four and one-half cups of flour with enough more flour to make a soft dough. Put in the tin box or some cold place to chill. Pat and roll to one-half inch in thickness. Cut in small portions on a cookie sheet and allowed to spread. Before baking them you may put a bit of shredded coconut on each cookie and sprinkle with sugar. Cut in small rectangles before moving from the pan.

FILLED COOKIES.
Cream one-half cup of shortening together with one-half cup of brown sugar, add one-half cup of molasses, one egg well beaten and one-fourth cup of sour milk. Sift together three cups of pastry flour, one teaspoon of baking powder, one teaspoon of soda, one-half teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-fourth teaspoon of cloves, one-fourth teaspoon of nutmeg and add to the first mixture. Mix thoroughly and chill an hour before using. Roll out thin, cut in strips, about two by four inches, spread one-half lightly with filling and fold over to form a square. Bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven.

Dawes Plan Will Not Be Killed By Troops On Rhine

PARIS, Dec. 23.—(By International News.)—Governmental circles flatly denied today that a continuation of the Cologne occupation by troops of the Allies would endanger the carrying out of the Dawes plan for the rehabilitation of Germany. It was pointed out by government officials that the Dawes experts urged the necessity of evacuating the Ruhr, but no mention was made of the left bank of the Rhine. High French officials declared that the Dawes plan was drawn up taking the Cologne occupation into consideration.

LINER BUFFETED BY STORMS STILL SAFE

ABOARD THE AQUITANIA, Dec. 23.—(By Radio to International News.)—After two days' struggle against a full gale of hurricane force and tremendous seas, the Cunard line's Aquitania was gradually increasing its speed with the expectation of reaching New York behind schedule but with no threat of disaster. Saturday's run was 220 miles and Sunday's 252, the lowest two-day run in the vessel's record. Capt.
