

Kohawks Point For Opening Game of Mid-west

CRIMSON CAGERS HAVE SHOWN IN AND OUT FORM IN PRACTICE

Jenkins Does Not Know What To Expect Of His Charges; Brown Handicapped With Frozen Feet; Badgers A Mystery.

DECLARING that he hardly knows what to expect of his team, Coach Burt Jenkins will toss his Kohawk cagers in the arena Thursday evening to inaugurate the Mid-west basketball campaign with Ripon college forming the opposition. The game will be played in the Y. M. C. A. at 7:30.

Listening to what the Crimson mentor has to offer, one forms the idea that the Kohawks are a crew of "in and outers." In one practice session they seem to gather the desired momentum, but in the next, sluggishness appears to be their watchword.

Inability of his wards to find the hoops consistently also is causing the new coach some worry. Lack of accurate basket shooters has been a handicap of Coe teams for several years, and if this season's outfit fails to win, the fault will point in the same direction.

The condition of Stanley Brown, regular guard, constitutes another of Jenkins' troubles. Brown's feet were slightly frozen during the cold weather and it has been necessary to keep him on the sidelines for the most part. Van Eiman has been working with Captain Stulke at the gymnasium but it is believed that Brown will be in shape to play at least part of the Ripon game.

Otherwise the first five continue as previous with Harry Lamb at center, William Lamb at center, and Tullie at the forwards. Sid Mitchell, Lamb's understudy at center, has been out for several days because of illness and probably will not be available for Thursday's encounter.

The team that will represent Ripon is a mystery so far as the Kohawk camp is concerned. Coaching professors to know absolutely nothing of the Wisconsin aggregation but it is a fact that Ripon generally has a fast combination so it looks as though the Crimson cagers will face serious opposition in their attempt to start the conference chase with a victory.

IOWA'S NEW INDOOR TRACK IS IMPROVED

Curves Widened And Course Now Considered One Of The Best In The West.

IOWA CITY, Jan. 5.—When University of Iowa track men report for the first indoor workout on Jan. 7, they will find what is considered one of the best tracks in the middle west at the new armory. Work on the improvement of the Hawkeye track was completed during Christmas vacation.

A track with gradual curves only slightly banked has replaced the old course with its dangerously sharp banked curves and its hard clay surface. The new track surface is covered with a two inch layer of fine cinders and clay. Two straightaways of fifty and sixty yards have been laid out on either side.

Jumping and vaulting runways are of the same surface combination and are expected to be as fast as the track itself.

The course is now one-tenth of a mile in circumference and there is only a difference of two feet between its curves and those of the Illinois track, admittedly the finest in the country.

According to the athletic authorities here, competition on the new track this winter is expected to shatter all the former records. Presently the course was difficult for opposing teams and visitors were considered to have been at a disadvantage.

The new track will be initiated at the first local inter-collegiate meet of the year between Wisconsin and Iowa Feb. 21.

American Diamond Powers Are Given Medals By French

Osage Indians Want Larger Payments For Incompetents

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(By Associated Press.)—The council of the Osage Indian tribe of Oklahoma, nine strong, accompanied by several members of the state legislature, to enable incompetent members of the tribe to obtain larger quarterly payments of receipts from tribal oil lands. A recent supreme court decision limited these payments to \$1,000 for each one. Before this decision, guardians of each incompetent Indian had been paid the full per capita share of the tribal receipts, amounting to about \$5,000 a quarter.

RADIO MANUAL

Great care must be exercised when calibrating a radio compass in order to have it accurate. If the loop is inside a building there is certain to be error, because of metal structures and objects in the building, such as radiators, stoves, pipes, and wires, which pick up radio waves and re-radiate them. This causes the loop to show a false direction. A test writer placed in a radio compass room after the set has been calibrated has been known to cause a variation in reading from five to ten degrees. The entire room in which some radio compass stations are located is copper-lined on the ceiling, walls and floor.

Some of the latest position-finders including that of the U. S. Leviathan, have a gyro-compass repeater located at the base of the loop's axis in the plane of a calibrated 360-degree scale. A radio position-finder combined with a gyro-compass makes it possible for the operator to obtain a true and accurate location of the bearing of a radio-bearing station. An indicator installed in the chart room, a navigator can put on the phones, tune for the Nantucket-radio beacon, and then turn the wheel which revolves the loop around the bearing of Nantucket, are inaudible at minimum intensity. This indicates that the plane of the loop is facing Nantucket, and by reading the pointer on the repeater compass dial, he can get directly and accurately the bearing of Nantucket. He may then tune for one or two other radio beacons and determine their bearings in a similar way. Then by plotting the three bearings from the three known points, he can locate the point of intersection of the three bearings and get the ship's true position.

The three most important advantages of the gyro-compass, over the magnetic compass, are that it points true north instead of magnetic north, and therefore eliminates errors of variation; secondly, it is not affected by the iron or steel of the ship, and hence is free from errors of deviation; thirdly, it can be used as a master compass and the service compasses are repeaters of the master.

Millions of dollars have been spent for foghorns, but they are all placed to operate in the same way, in the intensity of the atmosphere which hinders sound waves from traveling in a definite direction, and because of refraction there are some areas where no sound can be heard.
