# CITY CENSUS BEGINS, 24 MEN ON THE JOB

### Fifty-two Questions Will Be Propounded And Each Must Be Answered; Assessors Start Work.

Taking of the 1925 state census in Cedar Rapids began at 1 p. m. today when twenty-four enumerators identified by blue ribbon badges and ready to fire fifty-two questions at every resident in the city.

Under the direction of Dom Peier, city assessor, in charge of the census the city will be covered by precincts. An enumerator being assigned to each block to complete, within a month, which it is believed will be a record for cities of this size.

He asks that folk co-operate with the enumerators in answering questions promptly and accurately and in this connection he calls attention to the state law that gives an enumerator right of entrance to all homes and buildings, except those under the direction of the state board of control, and which makes a person who refuses information liable to arrest.
