Griswold, state epidemiologist and director of the state bactériological laboratories at the University of lown college of modeline, said in an interview here. Ninety per, cent of the problem, neording to Dr. Griswold, is concerned with the control of stray cogs. The state law, he points out, provides that "all citizens may, and ill peace officers shall" destroy unitypased dogs. While other animals, including cats, cattle, horses, and even ferrets, are susceptible to the malady, the dog is the real source of its spread, Dr. Griswold says. 


OUR CROSS-WORD PUZZLE
