Barred Player Dropped From Basketball Loop But Heydler Will Dig Up Facts Relative Kelly, Bobne.

ated Press).-President John A. Heydler of the National league and Manager John J. McGraw of the Glants await further word from the Pacific coast before taking any action regarding the reported member ship on the same basketball team of Jimmy O'Connell, barred from baseball, and George Kelly of the Giants and Sammy Bohne of the Reds, New York baseball circles were President Heydler immediately sent a telegram to the coast asking for details. In the President's opinion, the National league will take up the matter if the office of Judge Kensaw M. Landis, commissioner of baseball, fails to act.

O'Connell Dismissed

Although O'Conneil was immediately dismissed from the basketball league by the president when word that the situation endangered the baseball careers of Kelly and Bohne reached him, the National league president said that he would continue with his investigation.

National league executive indicated his belief that the damage was already done by Kelly's agreeing to ready done by Kelly's agreeing to play on the team which included O'Connell. Whether he actually as-sociated with the banished player, he held, was merely a technicality. Bohne Impeached.

In Bohne's case, it was recalled that he was implicated with Pat Duncan in charges by a Chicago sports publication that they were approached by gamblers' seeking to have then "throw" games to the New York Giants in a critical series in the mid dle of the season of 1923.
