

Notre Dame Alumni Condemn Sportmanship Of Warner And Players

WARNER'S REMARKS AND STEEL BRACE OF LAWSON'S THE CAUSE

Irish Supporters Charge That Illegal Use Of 'Brace Resulted In Injury To Bach, Other Players; Relations May Be Strained.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 6.—Alumni and supporters of Notre Dame who remained here after the New Year's game with Stanford at Pasadena are not mincing their words regarding the sportmanship of Coach Glen Warner and his Stanford players.

Notre Dame followers resent the statement made by Warner after the game in which he tried to deprive the Irish of credit for the victory. Warner is credited with having said that Stanford was a better team and would win if another game could be played.

The fact that Captain Jim Lawson of Stanford wore a steel knee brace which was covered only by a thin white cotton stocking also was condemned by the Notre Dame people. The wearing of such a device, according to football men, is against the rules which specifically state that no hard or unyielding substance shall be used in the protective armor of any player.

Cause of Bach Injury.

This steel brace, it is said, resulting in Bach, Notre Dame tackle, having two ribs cracked early in the game and in other players sustaining bruises which they will carry for some time to come. It further is charged by Notre Dame alumni that Lawson did a lot of unnecessary piling up and used the steel brace to good advantage in the first quarter before he was forced to cover it with felt. This he did after Captain Walsh had appealed to Referee Thorp and Umpire Quigley.

Coach Rockne refused to comment on any of the incidents further than to say that Lawson should have seen to it that his steel knee brace was properly covered.

May Out Relations.

One prominent Notre Dame alumnus said it was the worst violation he had ever seen, pointing out that Lawson is an aggressive player and wondering he did not inflict more serious injuries on the best of Rockne's players.

Reports of the attitude of some Stanford alumni are prompting to belittle Notre Dame. It is extremely improbable that teams representing the two institutions will engage in contests against each other for some time to come. The injury to Harry Stuhldreher who had a small bone broken in his foot, was accidental, according to Notre Dame supporters.

CORNELL WORKING FOR RIPON OPENER

Captain Kasch Still Unable To Play; Team Shows Improvement In Practice.

MOUNT VERNON, Jan. 6.—When the Ripon college quintet appears at Mount Vernon Friday, Coach L. T. Sealwacher and his Cornell basketball squad will open the Cornell home season and at the same time blow the lid off her Mid-west Conference schedule.

The Purple quintet was not very successful in its early season contests but did show considerable form and ability in the three preliminary games which will contribute greatly in the team's play through the rest of the season. The Purple athletes have returned from their trip in Illinois and started working yesterday for the Ripon game. With the opening of classes today, the rest of the squad will be added substantially to the practices.

Captain Warren Kasch still is unable to enter the lineup with his teammates but Sealwacher is in hopes of bringing him around before many days. Dean, Green, and Beld who have been working at the forwards, have made a large number of Cornell's points. Diekoff at center has also accounted for several points as has Clemmer who played at the pivot position. Hartwell seems to have his old eye for the hoop this year and has been successful in tossing one to three baskets in each game besides playing a good game at guard. Hines and Dyceman continue to show up best in the other guard post.

Coach Chandler's team is still green although a good many of the rough places have been ironed good shape and will probably be able to play most of the games this season. His condition was a source of worry to Chandler all fall, for he is the main cog in the Cyclone machine. Searing accident he will be able to play regularly. Now that Earl Elliot has returned, the offensive strength of the squad has been materially strengthened. Elliot, a forward, is fast and lundy with the ball and makes an excellent mate for Raff. His eye is also improving and he has been finding the basket consistently in practice. Weight, Kilgaman and Wheeler make up the reserve strength for the forward positions, with Anderson as another possibility.

Anderson is a good man, but has two faults he must overcome, fumbling and erratic passing. Jacobson playing good ball at center, but still lacks stamina. Flsher has been showing possibilities as a floor guard, but was sick most of the vacation period and did not report for practice until last Saturday. He will not be in condition for the next two games, according to Chandler. Coe, another floor guard, although inexperienced, has shown up fairly well during practice and may get a chance to show his wares against the Tigers. He has also been used some at center as a floor guard. He is a hard worker, but lacks judgment. Experience should improve him considerably. Miller is still playing back guard in good shape, although he does not participate the opponent's offensive attack as soon as he should.

NEBRASKA WILL NOT GET CHICK MEEHAN

Refuses To Confer With Husker Officials; Reported He Will Go To N. Y. U.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(By International News.)—Although John F. (Chick) Meehan, Syracuse football coach, is said to have been in receipt of offers from Nebraska and Southern California, a definite report was in circulation today that he had accepted the offer of New York university.

REFUSES NEBRASKA.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—John F. (Chick) Meehan, resigned football coach at Syracuse university, has telegraphed University of Nebraska authorities he "is not interested" in the Nebraska vacancy. It was announced yesterday at athletic headquarters of the university.

A member of the Nebraska athletic board explained that the Cornhuskers had not made the Syracuse monitor a formal offer, but merely inquired if he was in a position to consider the position open at the local institution.

Meehan, as a player, was a member of a Syracuse team that went down to a 10 to 9 defeat before Nebraska and later an quarterback directed a 3 to 0 victory over the Cornhuskers.

In 1922 as coach he scored a 3 to 6 victory for Syracuse over the Nebraska team, which had defeated all other foes including Notre Dame and had been hailed as invincible. In 1923 Syracuse again invaded Lincoln and inflicted a 7 to 0 defeat on Nebraska.

INDIANAPOLIS TIES ST. PAUL IN FIELDING

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—(By International News.)—St. Paul and Indianapolis were tied for fielding honors in the American association, each team having a percentage of .888. In individual fielding, Ray Schmandt, former Dodger player, now playing with Indianapolis, led the first base-men. Albert Betzel, Louisville, carried off the honors for regular second basemen. Joseph Rapp, of Topeka, led the third basemen. H. J. Schreiber, Columbus, led the short-stops; Hugh High, Columbus, Bunny Brief, Kansas City, and W. Christensen, St. Paul, the outfielders.

I. C. Five Wins From Monticello Quintet, 19 To 12

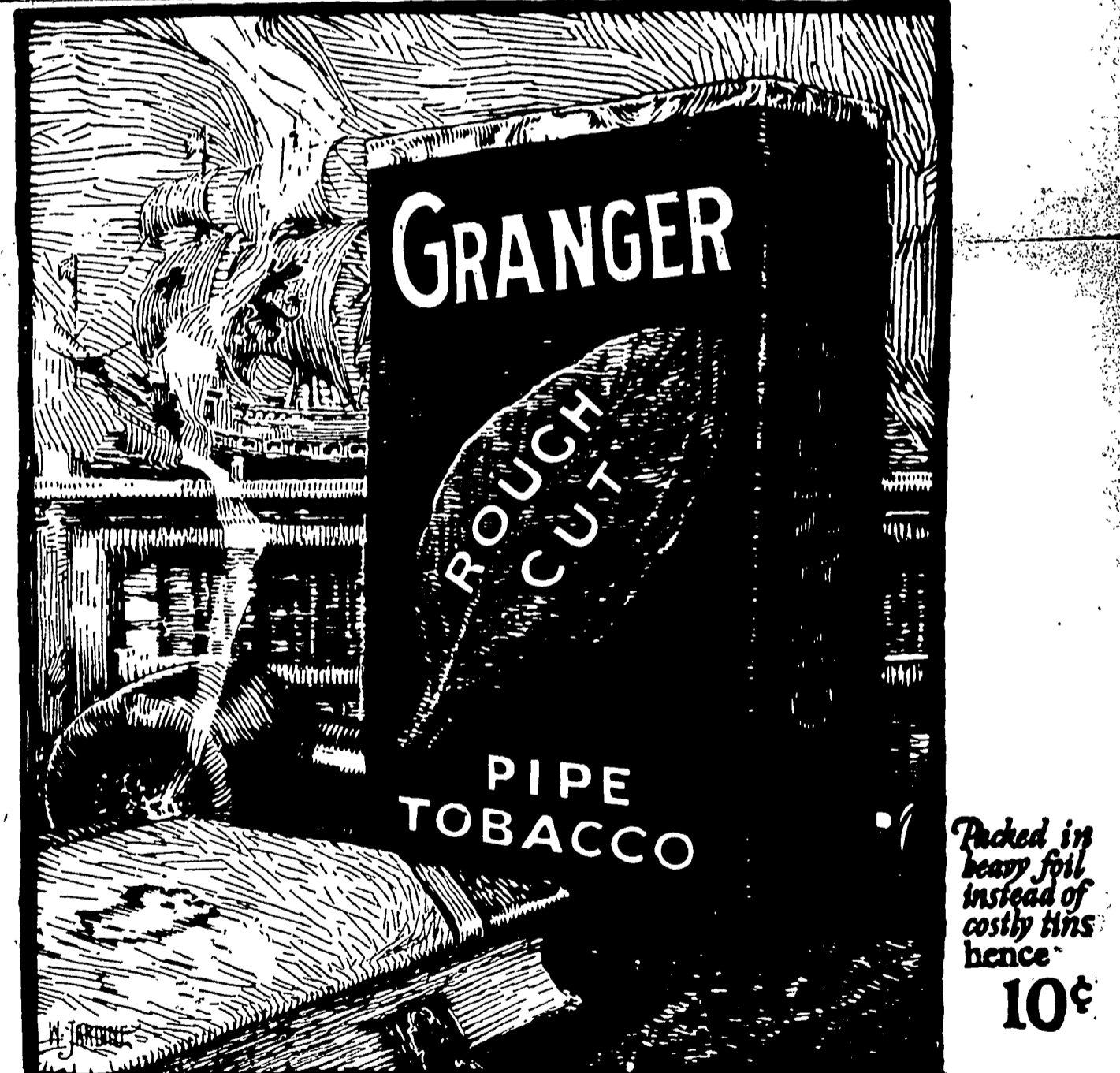
