

## SCIENCE TAKES UP STUDY HEAD COLDS

U. S. Producing 200,000,000 Cases Annually; Doctors Disagree As To Cause; Fresh Air Is Remedy.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. - The among other things-more than 200, among other things—more than 200, 000,000 colds a year. This is only a rough estimate. It is a rather conservative one. The public health service is making the first nation-wide study of colds, and it has already announced that along fairly representative groups of persons only 10 per cent had no colds and the other 90 per cent had an average of almost two colds during a age of almost two colds during Here, then, is a matter of interest and importance to almost the entire population of the United States.

And yet doctors have not paid much attention to it, even though they realize that the common cold often leads to serious maladies. Knowledge of a subject of this sort comes only by research and study. Consequently, while the medical profession has been probing the mysteries of dreaded contagious diseases, the common cold has been treated casu-

Chlorine gas could be used in-s limited way to prevent people from catching cold. It has been suggested that a weak concentration of the gas would purify the air of theaters, churches, and other crowded halls, just as a chloring solution is used to purity water. This would tend to safeguard the persons in an audience against the colds owned by their neighbors, but it would have no permannet magic effect. Waging warfare on the bacteria is important, but the point is that the germs do not work

The specialist points out that just as the eye is affected by poor light, the ear by excessively loud sound, or the stomach by bad food, so the respiratory tract is influenced by abnormal conditions in the atmosphere.

### Causes Of Colds.

One reason why colds are so nuch more frequent in winter than much more frequent in winter than in summer is that in winter we are constantly experiencing a striking variety of temperatures. The changes in themselves may not be dangerous, but the conditions which accompany them frequently are Itooms that are overheated rarely have any fresh air circulating in them. The hot, still atmosphere of such a room is over-dry. With trising temperature, the air has increasing affinity for water vapand it abstracts what moisture can from the air passages of the luman beings in the room. This places a strain on the nose and throat passages. In addition, poisons, from exhalation and fuel and possibly from gas lets are being breathed. The remedy is to admit fresher, cooler air, and it is prefer-able to open windows and doors wide for a few minutes rather than common cold has been treated casu-ally, and has become commoner every year. Even now, doctors do not agree as to the causes of a cold, nor as to exactly what takes place in the body of a person who catches

For some reason, however, the head cold has at last gained the attention of science. The public health service is making some studies of causes and treatment in its national survey. The chemical warfare service is still experimenting with chlorine gas treatment. Individual physicians are also contributing their ideas and experiences.
