SCIENCE TAKES UP STUDY HEAD COLDS

U. S. Producing 200,000,000 Cases Annually; Doctors Disagree As To Cause; Fresh Air Is Remedy.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The United States is now producing—among other things—more than 200,000,000 colds a year. This is only a rough estimate. It is a rather conservative one. The public health service is making the first nationwide study of colds, and it has already announced that along fairly representative groups of persons only 10 per cent had no colds and the other 90 per cent had an average of almost two colds during a five-and-one-half month period.
