

SAYS PUBLIC MISLED ON MAD DOG SCARE

Dr. Eastman Declares Tests Used To Determine Disease Not Entirely Accurate.

There has been no large outbreak of rabies in the state of Iowa, as has been commonly believed in the last few weeks, and reports of it have been unnecessarily alarming, according to Dr. D. A. Eastman, local veterinarian, and Theodore Mohrbacher, dog handler.

The tests used for detecting hydrophobia in the brain of a dog said to have died from that disease, are by no means entirely accurate, Dr. Eastman declared.

Mr. Mohrbacher, who has been handling dogs for twenty years at Glenway kennels, declares he has never seen a case of rabies, or talked to a experienced dog handler who has seen any such case.

In order to facilitate taking of the 1925 census which was started Monday afternoon, a list of the questions which enumerators will ask is here-with presented.

If folk will go over them, obtain the information necessary and be ready to answer promptly and accurately when the enumerator calls, it will greatly facilitate the work, Dom Petersen, city assessor, in charge of the census in Cedar Rapids, declared today.

Mr. Petersen emphasized that the information obtained by the enumerators is strictly confidential and is used only for the compilation of statistics. The census books when completed are turned over to the state without names being made public.

Emma Fordyce Pays Tribute To Service Of Miss Palmer. And Miss Wildey; Presents Pictures To School.

In honor of Miss Carrie M. Palmer and Miss Carrie M. Wildey, teachers of Washington high school who died within the last two years, a special assembly was held today in the school auditorium.

A picture of the Alice Freeman Palmer memorial, a beautiful piece of statuary which stands in the college chapel at Wellesley was presented in honor of Miss Carrie Palmer, while a reproduction of George Wendt's "The Silence of Night" will honor Miss Wildey's memory.

Miss Fordyce's talk followed two musical numbers by the mixed glee club which sang "Lovely, Apparent" from "The Redemption" and "Oh, Immanuel Our Comforter," led by Miss Olive Barker.

After all, said Miss Fordyce, it is not the stone walls that make up an institution of learning, but the teachers and students, past and present, within those walls.

"This is Washington high's memorial day in which memories treasure is recalled. Less than a year ago, Carrie M. Wildey, after many years of faithful and cheery work, dis-

Committee Appointed To Operate; Board Hears Talk On Contract Sales; Election At Next Session.

If C. Ring, local attorney, described methods of handling contract sales of real estate, before the Cedar Rapids Real Estate board last night in the Chamber of Commerce building.

Members of a new committee, M. A. Bolton, A. G. Bauder and Horace Hedges, were appointed. This committee will assist the Cedar Rapids zoning commission in carrying out its duties in connection with city zoning, George B. Ainslie, the president, announced.

The annual election will be held at the next meeting. Nine members of the board of governors will be chosen. This board names its own officers. A special meeting, in which the public will be invited, is also planned for the month of February.

P. D. Forman, formerly of this city, now agricultural director for the Woods Brothers company of Lincoln, Neb., will be the speaker at this meeting. He addressed the Iowa Realtors' association at its convention in Des Moines recently, and so impressed his hearing, that the organization obtained his services for a series of talks before local real estate boards of the state.

He will be invited especially to hear him when he talks before the local board of realtors at the next meeting.
