STANFORD STADIUM **WILL SEAT' 90,000**

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—(By Universal.)—Stanford university, 30 miles south of here is planning the influence football stadium in the world

in the south of here is painting the interest football stadium in the world—an oval large enough to accommodate 90,000 spectators at the annual university of California-Stanford "big egame" next November. The present bowl on the university campus seats 65,000 persons and it is planned to increase it to accommodate another 25,000.

The bowl which was built five years ago is one of the most unusual football stadiums in America, having been constructed of earth entirely and turfed over. It was designed by professors in the engineering department of the university when the athletic authorities found it impractical to raise the million dollars necessary to build a concrete bowl. In a sense, it is a hole dug in the ground as all of the earth for the bowl. The increase in easting capacity will be obtained by increasing the height of the bowl and by filling in one open end which was given over to a straightforway for given over to a straight-away for track events.


