

MOUND FARM CLUB WANTS BUS SERVICE

Petition Being Circulated For Presentation To City Council; Asks Extension To Street Car Line.

A petition to be presented to the city council by the Mound Farm Community club will ask that the Cedar Rapids and Marion city street car company furnish bus transportation to residents of the community as an extension to the Central Park car line.

The petition is being circulated among residents of the Mound Farm community. By the time it is ready to be placed in the hands of the city council, it is said, between 300 and 400 names will be signed, each signature representing a Mound Farm family.

The community has had such a large growth in the last few years that the present street car service is inadequate, according to George J. Ottsen, chairman of the club's transportation committee, which drew up the petition. Many families are forced to walk a half mile or more to the car line, while many folk must go as far as a mile to board a street car, it is said.

The club realizes that the expense of laying sufficient track would be prohibitive, Mr. Ottsen said. For this reason, he declared, the club offered action in asking the extra service to study what other means could be taken, and decided that the bus line, in connection with the street car, to be run by the same company, would solve the problem.

The street car company will be given a copy of the petition simultaneously with its presentation to the council, according to Frank T. Westmont, president of the Community club.
