Names Women Justices To Aid "Ma" Ferguson

To make "Ma" Ferguson feel at home as the first woman governor of Texas, Governor Pat M. Neft. who retires this month after four years in office, has named three women as special justices of the state Supreme court to try the case of Johnson vs. Darr, an El Paso litigation involving the Woodmen of the World, disqualifying the three regular mule justices from sitting in the case. The women he named are: Mrs. Hortense Ward, of Houston, one of "Ma" Ferguson's chief advisers; Mrs. Nellie Robertson, of Granbury, County Attorney of Hood county, and Mrs. Edith Wilmans, of Dallas, practicing attorney and the first and only woman member of the State House of Representatives. This is the first time in American history an entire court has been made up of women.
