

# Coe Wins From Ripon In Opening Game Of Mid-west Campaign, 27 To 19

## TULLIS LEADS KOHAWK CAGERS IN SCORING WITH 14 POINTS

Brown And Stuelke Also Play Strong Game; Crimson's Advantage Seriously Threatened Only Once; Lead From The Outset.

DISPLAYING a brand of caging that surprised even their most ardent supporters, Coe's basketballers hopped off to a most auspicious start in the Mid-west race last night when Ripon was conquered on the Y. M. C. A. floor, 27 to 19. The Kohawks were to the good at all times, taking the lead shortly after the initial whistle and maintaining the advantage throughout the combat.

Coe's triumph was due largely to the accurate basket shooting of Dale Tullis whose reported illness proved such a severe handicap that he succeeded in caging only six field goals and a pair of free throws for fourteen points. The speedy sophomore also played his usual fine floor game and distinctly demonstrated that he is destined to rank with the circuit's topnotchers this season.

Others Play Well.  
Coach Jenkins' other cripple, Stanley Brown also played a while of a game as did Captain Stuelke. Brown entered the conflict suffering from the after effects of a frost bite and emerged with a badly damaged right eye which was severely cut during a torrid skirmish in the closing minutes. The injury was sustained after Brown returned to the game when Ripon started a belated offensive that threatened to wipe out Coe's commanding lead.

Grant high's basketballers will make their third start of the season to-night when it university high of Iowa City will be played in the Roosevelt gymnasium at 8 o'clock.  
The U high coached by Wayland Hicks, former Iowa all-conference guard, is reported to have another fast aggregation this season. The Iowa City preps usually have a well balanced team and reports available indicate no slump on their part this year.

Since losing to Springfield in a scrappy game last Tuesday Coach Monihw has made a couple of changes in the Green and Gold line up that is expected to add strength to the attack. Nensiek has been shifted to guard while Snitzer has taken the former's place at center. Nensiek was not available for the Springfield contest which weakened Grant's offense.

Although defeated by both Dyrart and Springfield, hopes are held out that the west side quintet will register in the victory column tonight. The two first games gave Monihw's outfit much needed experience which stands it in good stead this evening. Tomorrow night Grant is booked to play the speedy Dubuque five in the River City. Ted Paysour's wards have not been defeated in Iowa this season and unless Grant shows improvement tonight the west siders are likely to take a drubbing in the week-end tussle.

Coe Runs Away.  
The second half found Tullis setting a pace that the entire Dubuque crew could not maintain. Of the twelve points registered by Coe in this period ten of them were accounted for by the slender forward. During the first half a pair of free throws after which Jones hit the hoop from the floor, Harris Lamb ran Coe's count to nineteen and Tullis started away for three field goals in rapid succession.

It was at this juncture that Brown left the game only to return after three enemy's baskets narrowed the margin. Another basket by Tullis and Jones' free throw completed scoring for the night.

Jones was the outstanding performer for the Wisconsin five while Houser was a good game. The lineup and summary:

# NURMI HAS EXPERTS GUESSING, REFERRED TO AS A SUPERMAN

Trainers Do Not Know Why Finn Is Great; Says Nietzsche Theory Strongly Founded.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Nietzsche, the German philosopher, preached in his works and lectures of the SUPERMAN if a man thought he was it, he was it, Nietzsche said. He won many followers, but it seems more dissenters among scientific men.

Pavel Nurmi has superman written all over him. He confounds all insofar as athletes are concerned, who say there are no supermen. Trainers and experts in the running game do not really know why he is so great, and there is no getting of a margin of his superiority.

Thousands and thousands of words have been written about him, praising him in superlatives calling him great. But I have yet to see a trainer explaining just how he can skim along in the beauty of some Greek god and annihilate time with no semblance of exhausting effort. No one knows how it is done.

It must be because he is a superman. He believes confidently he will do a mile in the startling time of 4:00 some day. It does not invite a laugh or even a snicker. He always looks serious after his mile runs, his eyes seem to shimmer, that he has exhausted himself.

He is an unhindered sapling, a young tree with the rhythm of a perfect poem landing on his heel rather than the bulls of the forefoot. He is strictly his own, as clear as a crystal, work in a cameo. In the "engine" of his heart, the pulse of his whole human heart, with a strong pulsing ego in his veins, as a driving force of monumental power Nurmi stands as a superman.

Who power has ego played in making Nurmi so great? His superb composure, his every move and deed planned, reveals plainly he has it. Nietzsche, with his strange theories who went insane right after the war.

Can't Describe Him  
I have talked with a man of my own set, with whom Nurmi, when he is in the light footedness of the three down abreast of a zephyr suggests supernatural attributes. This man is going to find out the strangeness of the man's uncanny power.

# "BIG" MUNN DEFEATS ED LEWIS FOR WORLD'S WRESTLING TITLE

Former Nebraska Grid Star Tosses Lewis From Ring In Second Fall; New Champ Unable To Handle Powerful Husker.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 9.—(By Associated Press.)—Wayne "Big" Munn, erstwhile University of Nebraska football player, who tried boxing, but couldn't stand up against the punches, and whose knowledge of the technic of grappling is that of a novice, is the new wearer of the world's heavyweight wrestling belt today.

Munn, by his prodigious bulk and strength last night threw off the careful headlocks of the veteran, Ed "Strangler" Lewis and crushed him into submission. Lewis is in a hospital, suffering probable injuries to his back, a new experience for the "Strangler," who, in his long career, has seriously hurt many opponents with his famous headlock.

A giant in stature and strength, Munn, despite his meager wrestling strategy, clearly demonstrated his power over the titholder in the opinion of many authorities, although a foul, which resulted in a protest by Lewis' manager, marred the victory.

Tosses Lewis To Floor.  
The climax came after two minutes of wrestling for the second fall when Munn, twisting free from a headlock, lifted Lewis high in the air with a body and crotch hold, apparently the only weapon at his command, and, walking to the ropes, hurled the "Strangler" outside onto the uncovered floor of the platform.

IOWA CITY, Jan. 9.—Freshman success with the Purdue style of basketball and the Hawks' first one conference victory isn't a date which to judge a team, Coach Sam Barry and his Iowa basketball team have put in busy days since the downing of Minnesota in an effort to dump Purdue. The Hawks upset the Bollweaver championship hopes last season and with an improved team the Iowa coach has hopes for victory tonight.

Coach Lambert is not taking any chances that he can help on losing his conference opener here which will be the second game played in the Big Ten race this year. He personally scouted the Iowa Minnesota game that tilted the lid from the Western conference show. The Purdue coach is known for his ability in doping usa for his versatile guard, Robbins and the new Iowa defenders will have plenty of trouble stopping him.

Thus guard is a strong defensive man, but his chief danger is in his accurate shooting and zig-zag light ning dribble.
