

# Coe And Grant Fives At Home Tonight; Tiger Tossers Play In Ottumwa

## LOCAL QUINTETS ALL BILLED FOR STRENUOUS ENGAGEMENTS

### Monmouth Meets Kohawks In Second Mid-West Tilt For Crimson; Novak's Tossers Out To Annex Fifth Straight Victory.

TONIGHT'S basketball program finds all three local teams booked for engagements that promises to test the mettle of the squads directed by Messrs. Jenkins, Novak and Monilaw. Two games are billed for local shores while the Washington tossers are in Ottumwa to compete with Coach Yount's combination.

Inspired by their triumph over Ripon last night, the Kohawks are down on the books for their second conference game this evening when Monmouth invades the Y. M. C. A. court at 7:30. The Illinois five is expected to give the Crimson a stiff battle, which may be especially strenuous if Jenkins' words show any ill effects of last night's encounter.

Brown's injured eye may prevent him from playing although every effort will be made to have the star guard in condition to take his regular beat.

Tigers Set To Go. Having scored victories in the four games to date, Coach Novak's Tigers are hopeful of running their string to five straight at the expense of Ottumwa. The Orange and Black machine has shown improvement each time out to date, and unless Eddie Yount has a stronger team than usually represents the down-state school it is unlikely that the Tigers' march will be interrupted at this time.

As usual there is no way of definitely forecasting the probable Tiger lineup. Novak generally makes one or two last minute changes in his battery, which serves to keep everybody guessing if nothing else. The squad that left this morning was composed of Hines, Bogel, Zvacek, Hitchcock, McClung, Cummings, Tangeman, Carter, Knapp and Arachur.

Grant Out to Win. Over on the West side Grant high will be host to University high of Iowa City. The Lawley prep are coached by Wayland Hicks, former Iowa captain, and doubtless will give Coach Monilaw's cohorts quite an evening of it.

The Green and Gold are hopeful of ending their third start of the season in victory, and changes made in the lineup this week may accomplish this purpose.

This game will be played in the Roosevelt gymnasium, starting at eight o'clock.

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## BROOKINS RETAINS AMATEUR STANDING

### Iowa Hurdler Hopes To Clip His Own Record; Finishes College Competition.

Special to The Gazette. IOWA CITY, Jan. 9.—Charles R. Brookins, Okaloosa boy who has kicked over every world hurdle record that the books record has not yet resigned the spikes. Charlie becomes ineligible this month but the end is not yet. It is understood that the famous hurdler has had several chances to enter the coming field, but he declares that he will retain his amateur standing for at least another year.

Charlie has already broken every world record in the event that he could find and although he is not yet officially credited with all of them, they are fast being recognized. He believes, however, that he can still lower those marks and will keep in training this year in an effort to do so.

Brookins was captain of the Iowa team last year and although running out of his event, finished second in the 3-foot hurdles at the Olympics last summer. He holds the low hurdle record for the 220-yard straight-away at 23 2/10 seconds, but has done the race on three official occasions in 23 flat and it is expected that this time will soon be recorded on the world books.

The 60-yard indoor event he set at 38 4/10 last spring, clipping 4/10 of a second from the old mark. The 220-yard race around one curve he has won in 1:00 1/10 and has been given American recognition and international sanction is expected. In addition, he has an American notable worthy performance in the 100-yard dash at 16 1/10.

But, had Ripon defeated Coe, it is not improbable that these same men would have been picked for the 100-yard dash.

## NURMI HOLDS 13 RECORDS

PAAVO NURMI increased to thirteen the total world records to his credit when he outfooted Jota Ray and Willie Ritola at the Finnish-American games at Madison Square Garden on January 28 with Ugo Frigerio, Italian, and George Goulding of Canada, prepared for a strenuous evening. Willie Plant, who won the two-mile event at the Finnish-American games, will compete as will the Austrian of Olympic fame, Mike Pelete. Frigerio is the world champion and Plant the best in America.

CHARLES HOFF, Norwegian pole vaulter, who holds the world record, will be unable to compete in the Milwaukee games at New York the latter part of this month. Hoff, a newspaperman, was unable to obtain permission from his athletic organization to cross the Atlantic.

NURMI'S ONLY RIVAL in this respect record books show, is G. E. Lerner, famous British Walker, who established ten world records from 1904 to 1908 that still are standards.

NEW YORK ATHLETIC club five-man bowling team came close to toppling world's record this week when it split the ten pins for a three game total of 3,368, or an average of 1,122 per game. The world's record of 3,487 pins is credited to the Rochester team in the old New York state league, made in 1913. The American Bowling congress record was hung up last year at Milwaukee, Wis., by the Nelson-Mitchell five with a total of 3,139.

LIGHTS FOR THE MATRON stakes of the West Chester Racing association for two-year-old fillies, closed recently with 288 entries, 48 more than a year ago. There is an added value of \$5,000.

## ILLINOIS INDOOR RELAYS TO ATTRACT PROMINENT ATHLETES

### Expect Upwards Of 800 Men, Boys To Participate In Big Meet Next Month; Records Also Are Likely To Tumble.

URBANA, Ill., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—Led by Penn-State's medley relay team, entries are pouring in fast for the eighth annual Illinois Relay Carnival to be staged in the huge armory here Saturday night, February 28.

Early entries received from 125 leading universities, colleges and high schools throughout the country which were invited to send representatives, indicate the record list of starters, in number and prominence. The games, which are the largest in American indoor athletic competition, will draw several Olympic stars, and scores of the best meter invitational race and field men of fame.

Penn State's medley relay team will be led by Alvin Helfrich, Olympic athlete and winner of the 500 meter invitational race in New York January 6 in the world record breaking time of 1:05 4/5. Washburn set a record in the college medley relay team and will be back to defend their mark this time.

Founded in 1917. The relays were founded in 1917 by Harry Gill, Illinois track coach who has made the Illinois supremacy in conference track for 20 years from 19 institutions. Each year the games have grown until last year 600 men came from 50 schools, 1600 this number and 500 are expected this year.

Superb lighting, heating and ventilation facilities characterize the immense armory which houses the world's longest indoor trackway, 75 yards in length. Both this and the circular cinder track, 6 1/2 laps to the mile, are extremely fast and have seen many world records cracked. The fact that spectators and competitors are well accommodated has added to the success of the games.

The eight relays are the class of the program. The university races consist of the medley, one, two and four miles. The college group is the same except for the 200 meter run, high and broad jump, pole vault, 75 yard dash, high and low hurdles at the same distance, 300 meter run. Seven events comprise the all-around championship, and the high schools have a mile relay.

One world record was broken, another tied and four carnal marks smashed last year. The unknown sometimes prove dark horses, as did little Paul Jones of DePaul, who astonished the experts by taking the all-around championship last year. Jones will be a strong contender again this year.

## U. S. C. COACHING SYSTEM CRITICISED

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9.—(By Associated Press.)—Dissatisfaction over the present system of coaching football at the University of California, southern branch, has resulted in the appointment of a committee of six students and a faculty member to investigate the criticism directed towards the existing system and submit a report to the student council.

Meanwhile, the question of coaching has brought a split in the student body, each side claiming they have a majority. Adherents of the present system of having the state fire the complete coaching staff as faculty members declare the agitation is the work of an active minority while the leaders of the movement to have the student body hire the head coach say they will win if the question is voted on by the students. The split has extended to the ranks of the football players, some having announced that they will not play next season if the present system still is in force.
