

### OTHER PLANS TO SELL PROPERTY UP TOMORROW

#### Norris Public Ownership Measure Is Defeated; Jones Bill May Pass.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(By International News.)—Administration leaders launched a final drive in the senate today to dispose of Muscle Shoals legislation by tomorrow.

Having substituted the Underwood bill for the Norris straight-out government ownership plan, the senate had before it two other Muscle Shoals measures. These were the Wadsworth and Jones plans. Both were offered as substitutes for the pending Underwood bill.

The proposal of Senator Wadsworth, republican of New York, was to appoint a commission of five, the secretary of war and agriculture and three named by the President, to dispose of the \$150,000,000 power and nitrate project.

Senator Jones, republican of Washington, would name a commission of three, the secretaries of war and agriculture, and one appointed by the President, to investigate Muscle Shoals and report back next December recommendations for disposing of the property.

Many administration senators who supported the Underwood bill, announced that they would now vote for the Jones plan. Senator Curtis of Kansas, republican leader, predicted its passage by tomorrow. A change of only six votes from the total from the Underwood bill would enact the Jones measure.

Progressives, chaffing under the 37 to 48 defeat given the Norris bill, said they would support the Jones measure as opposed to the Underwood bill.

### Fifteen-Year-Old Married Girl Is A Problem To Powell

Judge Thomas Powell was faced with an unusual case in police court today—the question of whether a 15-year-old girl who is married, is to be considered a juvenile because of her age or a woman because of her marriage.

The case was that of Mrs. Goldie Spoor, arrested in a local hotel at 230 a. m. today by Detective Stanley and Sgt. Bailey on a charge of disorderly conduct. No man was arrested with her.

Mrs. Spoor told the judge that she was married a year ago last June and left her husband about three weeks ago when living with him became unbearable.

Consulting the state code, the judge found that while it specifies that cases of persons less than 18 years old are to be considered in juvenile court, except in serious cases, but in another section of the code it is stated that a child automatically attains his or her majority by marriage.

The case was taken under advisement with a plea being taken. Charles Herbeck and L. L. Cunningham were fined \$2 for parking overtime and Donald Kimball, the same amount for parking his car on the left side of the street.

### Swindler Koretz Dead, His Widow Claims The Body

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—(By International News.)—Mrs. Mae Koretz, wife of poverty days, forgotten by the Leo Koretz, Bayanno oil bubble swindler, who she fled from Chicago with \$2,000,000, made arrangements today to take the body of her husband from Joliet penitentiary.

For Koretz had been released after serving 34 days of his ten year sentence. He answered the "last call" last night. Only Night Captain Michael Leonard was watching by his side. Diabetes was the cause of death.

During the day two brothers, Emil and Adolph Koretz, had looked on Leo, but were told that he was unrecognizable and probably never would recognize any one again, they tipped out. They were in the wardens' office when the end came, and with them was Mentor Koretz, young son of the swindler, but he had not seen his father.

Mrs. Koretz, the widow, received her first word of his death at Joliet. "I'm sorry," she said today. "I had known that Leo was in such a critical condition, I would have been down before, I would have liked to have told him good-bye."

### LOGAN MEETS HERRIOT ON U. S. WAR CLAIMS

#### French Prepare Program To Be Submitted To Council At Later Sessions.

PARIS, Jan. 8.—(By International News.)—A conference on American war claims was held today by Col. James A. Logan, American observer on the reparations commission and Premier Herriot of France.

Following this conference, Col. Logan informed United States Ambassadors Herriot and Kellogg of his unofficial conversations. Further informal conversations between Finance Minister Clementel and Chancellor of the Exchequer Churchill of England, were postponed until later because Clementel and French experts were closeted with Herriot planning the French program for the rest of the session.

The French delegation is being handicapped by the serious and sudden illness of Sydoux, France's foremost economist and financial expert. "I am optimistic that the conference will be successfully terminated early next week," Clementel told International News today. "The Anglo-American differences of opinion regarding America's annual per cent through the Dawes plan is the only serious question outstanding. This probably will be settled by assigning to the United States a part of the percentage, now going to Brussels. It is possible to do this because Brussels is now nearly paid up because of Belgian priority."

### TO SUBMIT NEW CLAUSES

DES MOINES, Jan. 8.—(By International News.)—Mrs. J. M. Wilson, widow of former Senator James M. Wilson, of Centerville, is a candidate for postmaster of the senate in the forty-first general assembly.

Mrs. Wilson was a familiar figure around the state house during her husband's term as senator. She is said to be receiving good support. Senator Wilson achieved fame principally as the author of the constitutional amendment prohibiting manufacture and sale of liquor, which put the old "Mule" law out of business.

### Wall St. Stocks In Sensational Rise

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(By Associated Press.)—Speculation in stocks was resumed on a broad scale today, more than two score issues soaring to their highest prices in years on gains ranging from one to seven points. The days sales ran close to 2,000,000 shares.

### Dever Says Women Make Enforcement Of Laws Possible

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—(By Universal.)—The greatest single force for law enforcement in society today is woman. Take it from William E. Dever, mayor of Chicago, who is here on a short visit.

Woman insists on enforcement of all laws, and just now is particularly interested in prohibition. "You can depend on the support of women in any fight to enforce the Eighteenth amendment because they are the greatest sufferers from liquor," said Mayor Dever today. "They know the value of law."

Women of Chicago have helped much in getting rid of bootleggers. Wives whose husbands drink are insistent on getting rid of liquor. "Wives have always been the persons to bear the burden of drinking men; today it is worse than ever. It used to be that moonshiners were reasonably careful as to whom they sold their goods. Now the vendors will sell to anybody with the price. And often that price is so high that it cuts out home necessities."

The mayor declared that Chicago is improving every day in having the law enforced. Bootlegging is as dead as a door nail today, although wines and home brews are being made in cellars. "I do not see the future of prohibition," he said. "I just hope there will be some modification of the Volstead law to make it easier for mayors of large cities to enforce the laws. Great cities are opposed to prohibition; New York and Chicago are. And there will always be some violations."

### City Uses Caution As Heavy Blanket Of Fog Fills Air

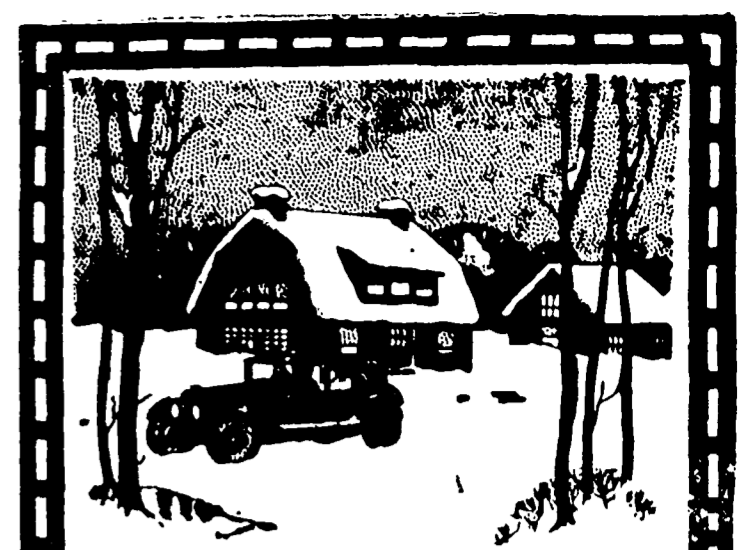
Fog horns would have been more appropriate than klaxons for automobiles early today while the city was shrouded in a dense mist which the brightest lights hardly could penetrate.
