DEBT SITUATION IS BIG WORRY TO U. S.

Forty-two Per Cent Of The Amount Owed This Nation Is Funded; France Is Uncertain Factor.

BY FREDERIC J. HASKIN WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The American people are hearing much concerning the indebtedness of European countries to the United States. Two developments have brought the question to the fore.

Finland has funded her debt of more than \$9,000,000 and the loan of \$50,000,000 to Hungary also has been put on a funded basis. Small loans which have been funded and the loan of approximately \$180,000,000 to Poland has been taken care of on the British model.
