

# Kohawks Beat Monmouth In Final Second Of Spectacular Game, 22-21

## HARRIS LAMB CAGES WINNING BASKET AS GUN ENDS GAME

### Crimson Center Plays Brilliant Game And Leads Team In Scoring With Six Ringers; Third Victory For Jenkins' Outfit.

WITH Monmouth leading by one point one second yet to play, and the fans going wild-eyed with excitement, Harris Lamb, Coe's star center, flipped a neat basket from mid-floor at precisely the instant the gun barked the finish of one of the most hair raising battles in local history, giving Coe a victory over Monmouth in the "Y" gym last night. The final score was 22 to 21. It was the third straight kohawk win of the season.

Coe had held the lead by one or two points until the last six minutes of play, when Monmouth came from behind with two field goals by Smiley, one after a dribble down the floor to the hoop and the other from a long shot from the side, which with Taylor's free throw made the score 18 all.

Molesworth of Monmouth twisted in another basket, giving the visitors the lead by two points. Coe took time out, and Coach Jenkins returned Willis Lamb to the fray. Tullis and Jones made a double foul, but neither scored on his free throw. Both teams tried frantically to score. Finally Harris Lamb again scored with a ringer making the tally, 20 to 20.

Monmouth Leads. The crowd went into a frenzy. Tullis fouled and Taylor made a free throw, giving the Illini a one point lead. The gymnasium rocked with the din of hundreds of hysterical rooters, seeing victory slipping from their grasp. One shot after another by the Kohawks just grazed the hoop, or missed the board entirely. Suddenly Lamb veered on one foot directly in front of the press table, mid-way in the floor, and shot. The ball had scarcely struck through the net, had not yet touched the floor below, when the gun exploded. Coe had won.

Except for Harris Lamb who garnered six field baskets, the Kohawks were off form when it came to finding the ring. By actual count, eight out of every ten throws went wild, generally by a narrow margin. Monmouth also played in hard luck, particularly in the matter of free throws, Jones making only three out of about a dozen by him and his mates. The team work of both fives was dazzling at times and kept the crowd on its toes as the ball raced back and forth down the floor. There was not a dull moment in the struggle.

Coe Scores First. Coe led off with a free throw by Harris Lamb, evened up by one similar from Taylor of Monmouth. Brown and Lamb each rang some long distance shots, and the score was 5 to 1. From then until the end of the half, Coe kept a two or three point lead. The first period ending 12 to 9, Taylor tossed a ringer after the five lined up for the last frame, making the score 12 to 11. Stuelke threw a free throw, Coach Bert Jenkins substituted Van Eman for Brown, and Little "Pinky" Sturges for Willis Lamb. The latter took the eye of the rooters, and besides several neat passes, made two field goals before he was retired. Both Brown and Willis Lamb were returned when the Monmouth spurt got under way.

Beside Harris Lamb's basket shooting the floor work of Tullis stood out, although he showed little of the brilliance either in passing or basket shooting exhibited the night before. Brown fought with the same fire of the Ripon game, but made many bad passes. Stuelke did some guarding and led to advantage in the offensive through the close Monmouth defense.

Taylor Leads Losers. Taylor was high scorer for Monmouth with nine points, but was belted ably in working the ball by Molesworth, who scored twice. Smiley made six points. Smith swarthy guard, with his long arms intercepted many a Kohawk pass. After the game with the fans wild

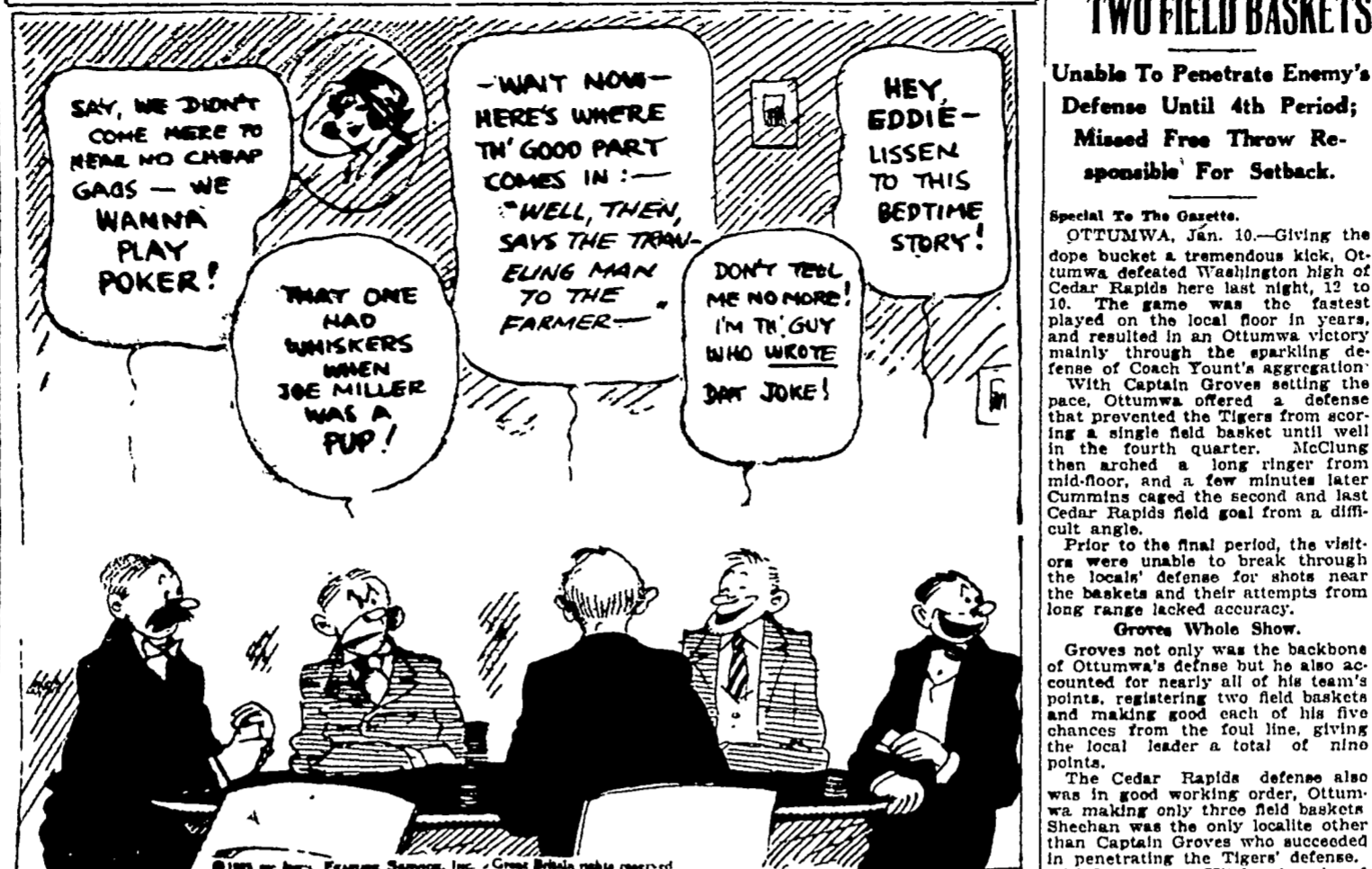

## NURMI RIDING TO DEFEAT IN OPINION OF NEW YORK CRITIC

### Finn Has The Class But Conditions Of Different Tracks May Work to Disadvantage.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—While the general excitement is at its height and the question of the hour is whether the gentleman in question eats fish for breakfast and keeps that school-girl complexion with shinola, it might be mentioned that Paavo Nurmi may be riding for a fall. He has allowed himself to be inveigled into accepting invitations by the carload lots and somewhere along the general right-of-way, it is quite possible that an American crowd will watch him run second behind some worthy young man, presently identity unknown.

This stunning event may happen no later than a week or ten days from this moment. On Thursday night next, he will go to the post at Madison Square Garden against a possible field in a 2,000-meter race. The distance has been shortened from two miles at Nurmi's request, although it is fact not fancy that he can run any distance from a quarter mile to ten faster than any man the world has known.

It might appear from this that Nurmi sees something coming. Two days later, he is to step out in a special mile and a quarter race at the Illinois A. C. games Chicago. The distance was increased at the request of two runners, and at Nurmi's request. He evidently has no intention of trying to repeat his Olympic program in which he ran and won miles at 1,500, 2,000, 5,000 and 10,000 meters in the space of one week. The distances he will run at the two meets are not markedly dissimilar.

The reason is not far to seek. Nurmi has ridden within the last forty-eight hours that he has bitten off a lumberjack's mouthful in agreeing to run a hard race here on Thursday night. He must step out against Joe Ray among others and that young man is likely to be several strides faster than he was on the occasion of Nurmi's American debut on Tuesday night last. Ray frankly admitted he was about a week away from top form. Before this race he had run 4.14 his fastest mile. Jole will be waiting for Paavo.

Conditions Changed. This effusion however must not be confused with a clarion call for volunteer public-spirited. If Nurmi were to run his native element of the outdoor under path, the writer would back him to win against the field every time out. But the Finn will find conditions piling up with every race he runs indoors. At Chicago, for instance, he will compete on a comparatively small track which will mean much crowding and elbowing at the turns. He will find few indoor tracks as much to his liking as the banked turn affair at the garden with its long straightaways. That track as nearly parallels outdoor running as anything the writer has seen. Nurmi's three world records there fore proved little beyond the fact that the Finn is a great runner. The writer had a suspicion of this from the start.
