The young people's church of St. Paul's Methodist church, going under the name of the St. Timothy congregation, now has a membership of 15 and is ready to begin its year's activities.

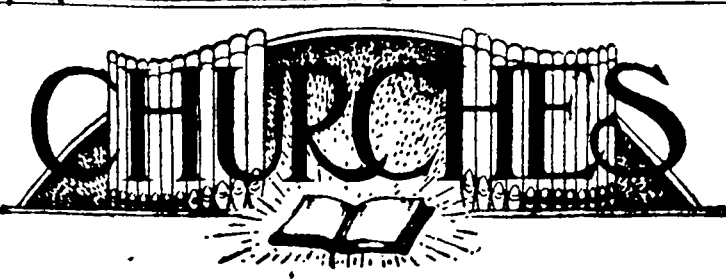
Walter Dunshee Takes Brother's Place Here

THERE ARE MANY successful women doctors, but few if any that are nationally eminent.

First, never to put their hands in their mouths or on their faces. Second, always to wash their hands with soap the first thing when they returned from school.

But there are lines in medicine where women doctors are making good—where the sex is not a disadvantage but an advantage.

Women are doing excellent work as pathologists. Hospital laboratories are more and more to depend on medical women for their technical work—such as blood analysis, delicate biochemical reactions, and microscopic work.

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MANY ORGANIZATIONS ASSIST RED CROSS

Prepare Quota Of Garments Requested By Central Division For Poor Island Folk Under U. S.

Many organizations are assisting the Linn County Red Cross in preparing the quota of nearly 700 garments requested of it by central division, to be distributed among poor folk in the outlying possessions of the United States.

A report recently prepared by Mrs. Meeta A. Burd, chairman of the volunteer service committee, shows that garments are being made by the following: Woman's Guild of Grace church, women of First Congregational church, business girls' class of First Presbyterian church, Susannah Wesley class of Trinity Methodist church, Laura Walker guild of First Presbyterian church, Suburban club through Mrs. B. G. Garb, philanthropic department of the Woman's club, domestic science class of Grant high school, Malta Kennington, O. E. S., Auxiliary to the home for the Friendless, Mrs. M. F. Fox is making fifty sundry items which will be placed by the chapter.

The Marion, Central City, Libanon and Mount Vernon chapters each sent checks of \$25. for the purchase of fabric for the garments, and Central City took over the making of ten dresses.

The entire quota for the Linn county chapter includes fifty boys' suits, and fifty pairs of pajamas, which will be sent ready made after the Red Cross label is affixed; and fifty baby dresses and fifty complete layette, including several days' wear, which are being made.

All the garments have been placed except thirty baby jackets and thirty bonnets, which were to be placed this week.

The cutting committee included Mrs. F. E. Stull, Mrs. D. E. Orr, Mrs. J. F. McAlinda, Mrs. Almo Adams and Mrs. E. T. Koch who worked at the home of Mrs. J. F. McAlinda. By cutting all the garments at headquarters, it was assured that they were uniform. They were then placed in the hands of helpers ready to be sewed.
