VETERANS URGED TO FILE FOR INSURANCE

Red Cross and Legion Offer Aid in Applications; U. S. Put to Great Expense By Procrastination.

That men who fought for the national honor, since it has been so long forgotten even to apply for it is the strange state of affairs being called to the attention of the public through the office of the Linn County Red Cross which is issuing an urgent appeal to all World War veterans to file their application claims at once.

The adjusted compensation law passed last May gave the time limit in which to apply for the bonus as 1928. But delay is not only costing the government great sums of money but may result in loss to the veteran of his family. It is pointed out by Mrs. Jennie I. Berry, executive secretary of the local chapter of the Red Cross, that the law gives the veteran a right to a bonus of up to \$10,000. If he had taken the time to file his application, he would have left his family \$1,500 in a lump sum.

JAIL FIVE FOR AUTO CRASH IN WHICH 1 DIES

Party At Des Moines Held Responsible For Accident On A Mad Drive.

DES MOINES, Jan. 19.—(By Associated Press).—Five persons were held in jail here today facing manslaughter charges growing out of a mad drive from Des Moines early today which resulted in the death of one man and the possible fatal injury of another.

Charles Christiansen 52 years old, Story City was instantly killed when the automobile driven by Ralph Switzer, 31 years old, stock buyer, Story City crashed into a roadster in which he was riding east of here. Aiders Jorgensen, 61 years old, sheriff of Audubon county, was struck by the same car in its flight from Des Moines. He is reported in a critical condition at the city hospital.

Arthur Restved 29 years old, Blancher Jackson Fred Maxwell, 35 and Mrs. Mabel Weaver, all of Story City companions of Switzer, were held in the city jail. It is understood manslaughter charges will be filed today.

Police men investigating the accident assert that members of the party had been drinking.
