Thrift was the subject of a sermon Thritt was the subject of a sermon by Dr. A. M. Jayne, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal church, yesterday morning. The sermon, which is the second in a series on "The Christian Home," was appropriate for the Sunday of National "Fariff week"

Dr. Jayno defined thrift as industry, 'economy, frugality and investment. Christian thrift, he said, began with the Christian's promise that nothing which comes into his hands was his own, but was merely fent him by a wise Providence, to use as best he might.

"Not only the farmer learns that his work goes for nothing without the partner who furnishes rain and syn to add to his labors, but the business man linds that what he considered his property was subject to the needs of his government and finally was given into other hands than his own when his course is run. "The Christian home must teach that a man does not have a right to buy whatever he can pay for. He has no right to buy what will not said to his assetuiness or to the welfare of society as a whole. The millionairo who lights his cigar with \$10 bills may be able to afford it but he is spending two full days of the average laboring man's life, in this country, or twenty full days of the average life in the world. "Christians should teach and practice economy as a virtue, even as to add to his labors, but the
