Daudet Says His Son Was Killed Under Police Instruction

PARIS, Jan. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—For more than a year Leon Daudet, royalist leader, has been building up the case against those who believe responsible for the death of his son, Philippe. He has proposed to the judiciary in concrete form last night, with formal charges against five men, including members of the police force. The boy was found in a taxi cab fatally wounded, in November, 1923. "My son," Daudet charges, "the police officers in order to balance the scales of justice, attempted to capture a dangerous anarchist who has designs on the lives of Poincare, Millerand and Daudet and to strike him down like a dog if he persists. The theory advanced by the royalist leader is that the policemen assigned to the raid were ignorant of Philippe's identity, that when they attempted to arrest the boy he made a quick move as though to reach for his hip pocket and that one of the policemen obeying instructions, shot him.
