

SCIENCE, ECONOMICS CLASH OVER ECLIPSE

Iowa Astronomer Says Observations Invaluable, Prof. Wassum Points To Big Loss Of Time, Money.

IOWA CITY, Jan. 27.—(By International News.)—Science and economics disagree as to the value of an eclipse.

Sciences represented by astronomy, says that observations made during the eclipse are invaluable, and often lead to discoveries that benefit the human race.

Economists on the other hand, point a scornful finger at the time wasted in viewing the eclipse and places \$2,000,000 in lost time in the balance against the observations of science.

Donald H. Menzel, instructor in astronomy at the University of Iowa, says the observations made during the eclipse are invaluable, and points to the discovery of helium, which resulted from an observation in 1818.

Dr. Clarence W. Wassum of the college of commerce of the University, brings a battery of facts and figures into action in showing the waste time of viewing an eclipse. Dr. Wassum points out that, according to federal figures, there were 4,614,248 persons in the United States employed in occupations.


He also estimates that average wage scale at 60 cents an hour, or one cent a minute. Basing the rest of his results on the fact that the eclipse was not visible in all parts of the United States, Dr. Wassum computed that twenty million people probably viewed the eclipse for at least a ten minute period. And that totals \$2,000,000 for the twenty million workers.


