

Dolan May Tell District Attorney Of His Part In Baseball Scandal

FRISCH AND SAND SUMMONED AS NEW PROBE GETS STARTED

Dolan's Attorney Says Banished Coach Will Welcome Re-opening Of Case; Ford Will Go Before Attorney Today.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Cozy Dolan, the man who may yet get around to the matter of remembering what he forgot, is coming back to Broadway with the next week's worth of hours to answer for his part, it is believed, in baseball's latest scandal.

His attorney, William J. Fallon, reaffirmed today his statement that Dolan will welcome a reopening of the case, but neglected to state just when Cozy will furnish a full evidence of this sentiment.

One report had it that Dolan would appear at the district attorney's office today to be questioned at or about the same time as Horace Ford, Philadelphia second baseman, the first man to whom Sand had admitted O'Connell's attempted bribery.

Brothers is Silent
Assistant District Attorney Brothers, conducting the investigation, is believed to know of Dolan's intentions, but Brothers is saying very little these days. He did admit, however, that if Dolan declines to appear, nothing could be done about it now.

The former Giant coach is believed by O'Connell to have been the inspiration behind his (O'Connell's) attempt to bribe Sand. He has been barred from baseball. Therefore, he no longer is under the jurisdiction of Judge Landis. The judge has notified the district attorney's office that he will produce all others identified with the case, with the exception of Dolan and O'Connell, the two men dropped from lists as a result of the original inquiry.

Only extradition proceedings could produce the pair here in the event that they undertook to ignore the district attorney's invitation. They can not be extradited until the grand jury is brought in by the grand jury. Perhaps Brothers may not be so far away from this step as might appear at first blush. At least he gave tongue to this optimistic remark after interviewing Frank Frisch and Heine Sudd yesterday.

Making progress
"I consider that we have made satisfactory progress in this case. We are making headway and I think we will get to the bottom of the scandal in time."

Just what would be his next step in the event that Dolan failed to appear, Brothers declined to say. Of course, recognizes that without Dolan his investigation is likely to run up a blind alley. O'Connell's declaring his readiness to appear, has already confessed.

Frisch, Young and Kelly are innocent in the eyes of the law as long as the charges against them are made only by a self-confessed conspirator. Dolan is the crux of the situation, provided there is a crux in the situation.

Sand and Frisch appeared before Brothers in answer to an order from Commissioner Landis who is cooperating in the probe to determine if a crime was committed under the penal code in New York state. Each spent an hour or more closeted with Mr. Brothers but nothing was divulged as to what transpired.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—America's army of athletic talent will be tossed into the lists at the Millrose A. A. games here tonight to battle the triumphant march of a foreign invader—Paavo Nurmi, peerless Finn.

A hand-picked field of college and club talent will test the endurance powers of Nurmi in a three-quarter mile race, the shortest distance he has been called on to race during his American campaign.

The Millrose A. A. games will bring together Olympic, National and intercollegiate talent. The first section of this two-day athletic carnival will see Nurmi facing Jole Ray, Illinois A. C. James J. Connolly, former Georgetown athlete and two intercollegiate middle distance stars in Lloyd Hahn and Leo Larivee, in the three-quarter mile special tonight.

The two stars will meet tomorrow night when they will match strides in a 5,000 meter walk.

The forty, fifty and sixty yard sprints tonight, bring together Jackson V. Schlicht, the only American to win a first place in the 1924 Olympic sprint events; Loren Murchison, Newark A. C. star and regarded as the best sprinter in the world on the indoor boards; Harold "Boots" Lever, former Pennsylvania and intercollegiate sprinting champion, and Frank Hlusky.

A highly talented field of jumpers will compete in the running high jump. These include Harold M. Osborn, Illinois A. C. all around athlete who won the Olympic decathlon in this event.

Topping off tonight's program will be Willie Ritola's appearance in the three-mile run when he will be called on to outrace a field of six opponents.

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CINCINNATI MUST STRENGTHEN INFIELD AND PITCHING STAFF

Bressler Slated To Take Daubert's Place At 1st Base; Youngsters May Bolster Team; Luque And Donohue Slipped Last Year.

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—The Cincinnati Reds represent an uncertain quantity in the 1925 National league pennant dash but if club spots in the infield and pitching staff are eliminated, the club promises to be a prominent factor in the race.

The winter stove league period for the Reds has been one marked with a dearth of trades which might have strengthened the team in all its positions. Furthermore, there is not much opportunity to complete a deal which would whet the fielding and hitting average of the team, although a trade of some sort may be closed before the opening of the spring training season.

The club has purchased a few minor league players during the winter and some are possessed with ability that made other teams bid for them. The brightest star to drop in was Red Lincecum during the off season from St. Paul.

Bressler on First
Rube Bressler, utility outfielder will play first base for the Reds.

Bressler, who recently signed his contract containing a stipulation that he can not be sold or traded during the coming season, started with the Reds as a pitcher filled in as an outfielder and during last season, substituted for Jake Daubert when the veteran was sick.

Daubert died just after the close of the last season.

Hughy Critz, peppery second baseman, will continue at that position unless ousted by recruits. Pincilly Californian, will remain at third.

The shortstop position has several candidates, including Dreyson Bohne, last season's regular, Chet Fowler, and Topel.

Five newcomers augment the uncertainty of last year's pitching staff. All are of more or less known quantity, but manager Jack Hendricks is hopeful of plucking one or two regulars from the group.

Hurlers Had Off Year
Adolfo Luque, the Cuban veteran, had a bad season in 1924 while Pete Donohue, also was a disappointment

but Hendricks is confident they will come back this season.

The other regulars holding over on the mound staff are Carl Mays, Eppa Rixey, Jackie May, Rube Benton and Tom Sheehan.

Hargrave, Wingo and Jack Blott, University of Chicago catcher, compose the receiving department. Hargrave is the best.

The outfield has the redoubtable Ed Roush in centerfield, Walker in left Elmer Smith former American leaguer and Zitzmann, an international leaguer, will fight it out for the berth in right.

McPartland has coached in other fields, former Coe athletic director and baseball coach, who resigned last year.
