

### BRINGS RARE BOOK HERE FROM ABROAD

Charles Hanke, Formerly Of  
Czechoslovakia, Exhibits  
Volume Printed in 1562;  
Is Well Preserved.

A rare and interesting book, printed in 1562, probably the only one of its kind outside historic libraries and museums, has been brought to this city by Charles Hanke, for twenty years an official of a railroad in Czechoslovakia and now living at the home of his sister Mrs. August Sita, 1912 Mallery street west.

The book is one of 400 pages or more, dealing with herbs and plants, their medicinal properties, how to obtain the healthful extracts from them and the various uses of the plants for various diseases. It is profusely illustrated by pictures of the plants, the stills used and the coats of arms of the royal house of Austria. These pictures, printed in black and white, were colored by hand in a laborious process, judging from the book.

Originally written in the Latin by Peter Andrew, Mathiola Senensky, physician to the archduke of Austria, later the emperor of that country, the book was translated into Bohemian by Dr. Thaddeus Hayek, a Czechoslovakian nobleman. It still has an index in Latin, however.

The book was given to Mr. Hanke's grandfather by a family doctor. Mr. Hanke's mother remembers the book being in the house when she was a girl. Then it was lost for years and it was not until after the World War that Mr. Hanke found it again.

Because of its age, the book is well preserved, owing to the high quality of paper evidently used in publishing it.

Mr. Hanke came to this country eighteen months ago, after he was pardoned by the railroad. The pardon was so small that it did not provide a living for himself and family and so he came to the United States. He has been in the city but a few weeks, but hopes to obtain work here that will enable him to go back for his wife and two children before many years.

Mr. Hanke has with him numerous skillfully carved brooches, pins and trinkets, made from bones that were excavated by American picking houses.

Well it has been dramatized for the movies now, and the picture is at the Majestic the first half of the week. PALACE—"A Man Must Live" Richard Dix' new picture in which he is being featured at the Palace, is an appealing romance that will coax not a few tears to your eyes. The story is an adaptation of James Greelman's "The Jungle Law." Dix plays the part of a newspaper reporter, who is called on to face the dilemma of either writing a scandal story of the girl he loves or starving to death. He writes the story but when the girl understands he neither starves to death nor loses her. The story is packed with thrills, and a tender love romance also is told. The court room scene is emotional; the battle between the reporter and the yellow editor is realistic and the ending as happy as one could wish to see. There are snatches of comedy here and there to relieve the tension. Jacqueline Logan plays opposite Dix. Edna Murphy and other good players are in the cast. Other features include a farce and news reel. The program will be given for the final times Wednesday night.

### Bob Hall Tells 'Em In Rhyme And Makes 'Em Laugh; Majestic Has Fine Program

When a man can walk before the footlights and reel off rhymes and words so popular, so suggested by the town, and in which he set foot a few hours before, and about the audience he is facing and make that audience laugh, applaud and whistle, he's a headliner—and we don't mean maybe.

Such a chap is Bob Hall, one of the cleverest singles on any Majestic bill and the one who nearly stopped the show at the first performance last night. Hall's stuff is all extemporaneous, meaning it isn't cut and dried before he starts. He has something different at every bill, so we're told, and it is easy enough to believe it.

He started his act last night by telling about the previous acts on the program, talking about them in rhyming verse. Then he turned to the audience and picking out girls in the front row and folk in the boxes, described them, rapidly in verses of sense and nonsense. The audience was in a roar, and he hit his line. It is something new hereabouts. But the best was held for the last when he asked the audience to suggest topics of the day which he formed into verses for the tunes "That Old Gang of Mine" and "Yes, We Have No Bananas." The customers called him back and were all applauding him when the next act began.

As indicated, the whole bill struck the right spot with last night's audience. Betty Feisen and Jack Broderick assisted by Hill's Chicago Blue Devils (orchestra) and "Pinus" left have a dancing act that is striking in its interpretative numbers, notable in the grace, technique and pep displayed by Miss Feisen and her partner, and by the endurance

and skill of Left. The act is richly set and neither Miss Feisen nor Mr. Broderick is hampered by much wardrobe. The orchestra, besides playing for the dances, offers several selections in the most approved style of syncopation.

Another act that made a decided hit last night, even to an encore, was the song, dance and chatter of "Mary Goss and Charles Barrows." Things start rather trim with Charles appearing in a book recent past, but the act is made much more interesting when Mary changes her wardrobe and strums "Red-Hot Mamma" on the uke while Charles throws himself about in an eccentric dance.

The audience is taken back stage to the dressing rooms and given a bit of behind the scene stuff in the act of Jessie Hayward and company, presenting "Air Castle Kate." While building air castles for herself, Kate, the old time performer, wise to the ways of the theater, comforts the anxious girl who is trying to make a living for herself and baby while her husband finishes college. Jessie Hayward as the veteran, provides amusement for the audience by the way she gives the manager the raspberry. She's strong for him though, and what a blow when the property man punctures the air castle by informing her scornfully that the boss has a wife and six children.

The bill is opened by a performance of monkeys of assorted sizes and abilities under the direction of Anita Dix. They lay on their backs and roll barrels on their feet just like human acrobats.

The picture is "The Hoosier Schoolmaster," dramatised for the screen from the book of the same name.—J. R. B.

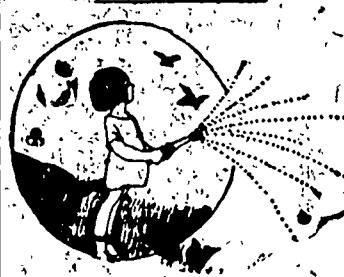

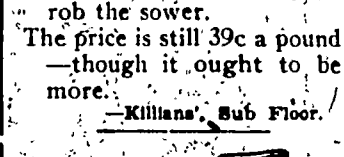
