

# Michigan Gridmen Start Practice For Next Big Race

## THIRTEEN MONOGRAM MEN ARE AVAILABLE FOR 1925 MACHINE

### Wolverine Coaches Will Have Veterans For All Positions; Stars From Frosh Eleven Will Give Regulars Hard Competition.

ANN ARBOR, Feb. 9.—(Special).—Winter football practice which started today, saw many new candidates for the University of Michigan gridiron squad out in uniform and ready for the light work-outs in tackling, passing and kicking. Outside Yost Field house, the grounds are covered with snow and ice but inside the mammoth building September playing conditions prevailed.

Thirteen letter men form the nucleus with which the Michigan coaching staff is working, all of whom will be varsity contenders next fall. These include: Flora, Muskegon, and Grube, Saginaw, ends; Babcock, Royal Oak and Hawkins, Saginaw, tackle; Dewey, Monroe and Hawkins, Saginaw, guards; Captain Brown, Ypsilanti, center; Dornhoff, Toledo, quarter; Gregory, Ann Arbor, Herrington, Chilliocothe, O. Parker, Hastings, and Friedman, Cleveland, backs; and Stammen, Toledo, fullback.

Varsity reserves who won their "A" last fall and who are out for the squad include Langwith, Cleveland, Heath, Corning, N. Y., and Witherspoon, Detroit, ends; Samson, Ypsilanti, and Hall, Ann Arbor, tackles; Ullman, Elmhurst, Ill., and Moloney, Detroit, guards; Froemke, Sheldon, N. D., and Davis, Flint, backs.

A large and promising freshman class puts strong contenders for varsity honors in the field. Among these are "Buster" Hawkins, End, Okla., a fast quarterback; Bennis Osterborn, Muskegon, an All-American high school center for two years; John Molenda, Detroit, a 190-pound back. Other freshmen out were Pauler, Jackson; Nickerson, former Oak Park, Ill. captain; Temesoff, a 200-pound lineman from DeKalb, Ill.; Moore, Sioux Falls, S. D., a 185-pound back and end; Ray Baer, Louisville, Ky., tackle; James Oeder, Lansing, former all-state tackle; Pomeroy, Ann Arbor, all-state lineman in 1924; Louis Gilbert, Kalamazoo, and Dan Wells from the same town are also players of more than average ability.

Martelle, former all-state tackle; Hoffman, Allegan, former Culver Military academy stars, and Schmilgen, Saginaw, are expected out Wednesday.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 9.—(By Associated Press).—Reports that Harry Kipke had been offered the position of head football coach at the University of Michigan, in succession to George Little, were denied by Fielding H. Yost, director of athletics today.

Reports have been prevalent for a few days that Kipke would be summoned to Ann Arbor from the University of Missouri where he has been assistant to Coach Henry since his graduation at Michigan last June. During his three years at Michigan, Kipke was an outstanding star in football, basketball and track. He was selected as a member of Walter Camp's 1922 All-American eleven, but failed to win such high honors in 1923, his last year at the Wolverine institution.
