SAUSAGE RECIPES.

Housekeepers are able in winter to include in their menus sausages and various combinations and arrangements of this fatty meat gives to the body the nutrients.

Have you ever tried baked sausage? It is a most delicious center of six, good sized links. The pulp possible from the Chop this and mix with one cup minced, cooked sausage meat. Add the apples with this mix. Bake in a medium hot oven. The apples are tender. Serve baked, or fried potatoes for lunch.

Sausage rolls are attractive appetizing as a luncheon dish. A baking powder biscuit dough roll it to one-fourth inch in thickness. Cut into oblongs and by two inches. In the meat cook twelve sausages in a frying pan until tender, but not crisp. Roll sausage in each oblong of the dough and roll up. Bake in a hot oven for ten minutes. When baked lay on a hot platter and surround with white sauce, creamed sliced of or fried apples, and serve at once.

For surprise rice croquette cook one cup of rice in quart of boiling salted water until soft. Drain and pour cold water through the rice to separate kernels. Season with one and four tenths teaspoons of salt, one-eighth teaspoon of pepper and paprika. Spread on a plate and when partially cooled, add one-half beaten egg. Chill entirely and form into quarters, rolling in the center of one-half of a small cooked sausage or a small ball of sausage meat. Dip the croquettes in crumbs, egg, and roll again and fry in deep, ungreased fat.

Smothered sausages may be prepared as a main dish. Fry one cup of sausage meat until tender. Add to it one cup of diced celery cooked until tender. Mix and moisten with two tablespoons of tomato pulp, white sauce. Prepare one quart of highly seasoned mashed potato. Add to it one-half beaten egg. Put into a thick roll with the sausage in the center. Lay in a greased baking pan, brush with the beaten egg and bake for twenty minutes in a medium-hot oven. Serve surrounded with white sauce, or tomato sauce.

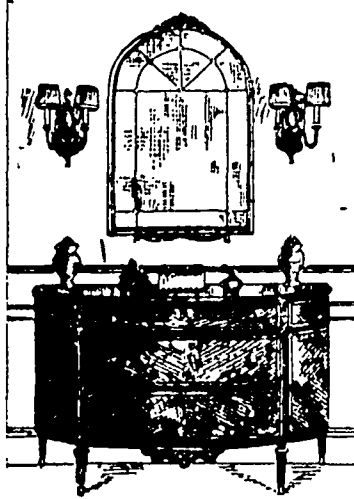

is a good example of the craftsmanship of the old masters with modern adaptations to meet present-day needs. Dressing cases such as these seemed to have somewhat fallen into disfavor during the last century but they are now coming back into more use and are a welcome change from the regulation dresser, another item you to bear in mind if you want to own a bedroom that is different from Mrs. Jones' and Mrs. Smith's. Especially interesting in this case because of its bowed front, the wavy grain and color of the drawer panels and the delicate decoration typical of the French style of furniture, the drawers are made of such a handsome piece of mahogany with such a soft dull finish that it needs no dolly or runner to cover it, being decorated only with a pair of Italian pottery urns and some dainty glass powder jars and a silk-covered trinket box.

FIRST PETITIONS FOR PAVING THIS YEAR

Petitions for paving to be done this year, began coming in to the city council today. One is a new request for paving the alley between Fourth and Fifth avenues and Ninth and Twentieth streets, while the other is a reminder of a former petition for hard surfacing the alley between Bever at Washington avenues and Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets.

The latter request was in the form of a letter from E. B. Zbancik, 1612 Bever avenue, who declares there are sixteen garages facing the alley in that block now. He requested the council that the petition was submitted last fall, but was declared too late for consideration in the 1924 work.

To insure more adequate fire protection on the east side, Fire Chief Kennedy recommended to the council today that six-inch hydrants with pumper attachments be installed at the following intersections: Sixth avenue at Nineteenth street; Eighth avenue at Fourth street; Greenwood and Ridgewood drives; Ridgewood drive at Daniels street. The matter was referred to the superintendent of the water works.

John Prochaska, 2007 K street west, sought redress through the council today against a neighbor who, he says, has built an unsightly shack so near the lot line as to obstruct the view from his house, and which he considers a nuisance. The case was referred to the building inspector for investigation.

STATE MEN TO FIND UNLICENSED MOTORS

State agents will invade Cedar Rapids next Friday for the purpose of arresting all motor car owners and chauffeurs who have not made application for their 1925 licenses, according to a unanimous report made to-day by H. A. Stearns, state automobile inspector.

Mr. Stearns has returned from a meeting of state inspectors at Des Moines and at this meeting an itinerary of the cities in Iowa was mapped out for visits by the state men to enforce the motor license law.

A similar campaign was launched against the delinquent motorists last year but the one promised for Friday will be more rigid and fines will be assessed. Mr. Stearns said that according to the automobile owners and chauffeurs who failed to procure a new license by Jan. 1 are subject to arrest and penalty.
