

Nurmi May Remain Here To Break More Records On Outdoor Tracks

ADVISED SAYS FINN CAN SET NEW MARKS FROM HALF ON UP

Expects To Beat His Sensational Record Of 8:58 1-5 For Two Miles; May Try For New Marks At Penn Relays.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Indications today were that Paavo Nurmi, the gentleman with the body of a man and the legs of an antelope, will remain in this country for the outdoor track and field season with the laudable idea of establishing world's records at all distances between 880 yards and ten miles.

Strong pressure is being brought to bear on the great Finn to reconsider his original intention of returning to his native land next month and the latest advisers were that he was about to capitulate.

If he does one of his first appearances outdoors will be at the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival late in April at which time he will be asked to try to get under his world's record of 8:58 for two miles less than forty-eight hours ago.

Franklin Field Past. The fact that Franklin field has one of the fastest cinder paths in the world is said to be one of the determining factors in Nurmi's disposition to remain with us indefinitely.

He will never get a more favorable chance, since two mile running is at once the most popular and the most competitive of all the events which America can and will furnish.

Whether Nurmi can better his indoor time is a moot question, since two miles can be stepped faster on the cinder than on the grass.

His adviser, Hugo Quist, professes to have no slightest doubt of Nurmi's ability to run yards faster for two miles on any track.

Nurmi can run close to eight minutes in ten minutes. Quist said after the race. "He seldom has run out to his best at any stage of the distance. This indicates to me that he can run a mile in four minutes or better and the half in at least 1:50."

If Nurmi attempts those times, the indications are that he will select the Harvard stadium track, probably the fastest in the world for the races.

The attempts must be made outdoors, however, for whereas a runner can travel a faster two miles and upward on the board, he is a bit slower under these conditions at lesser distances.

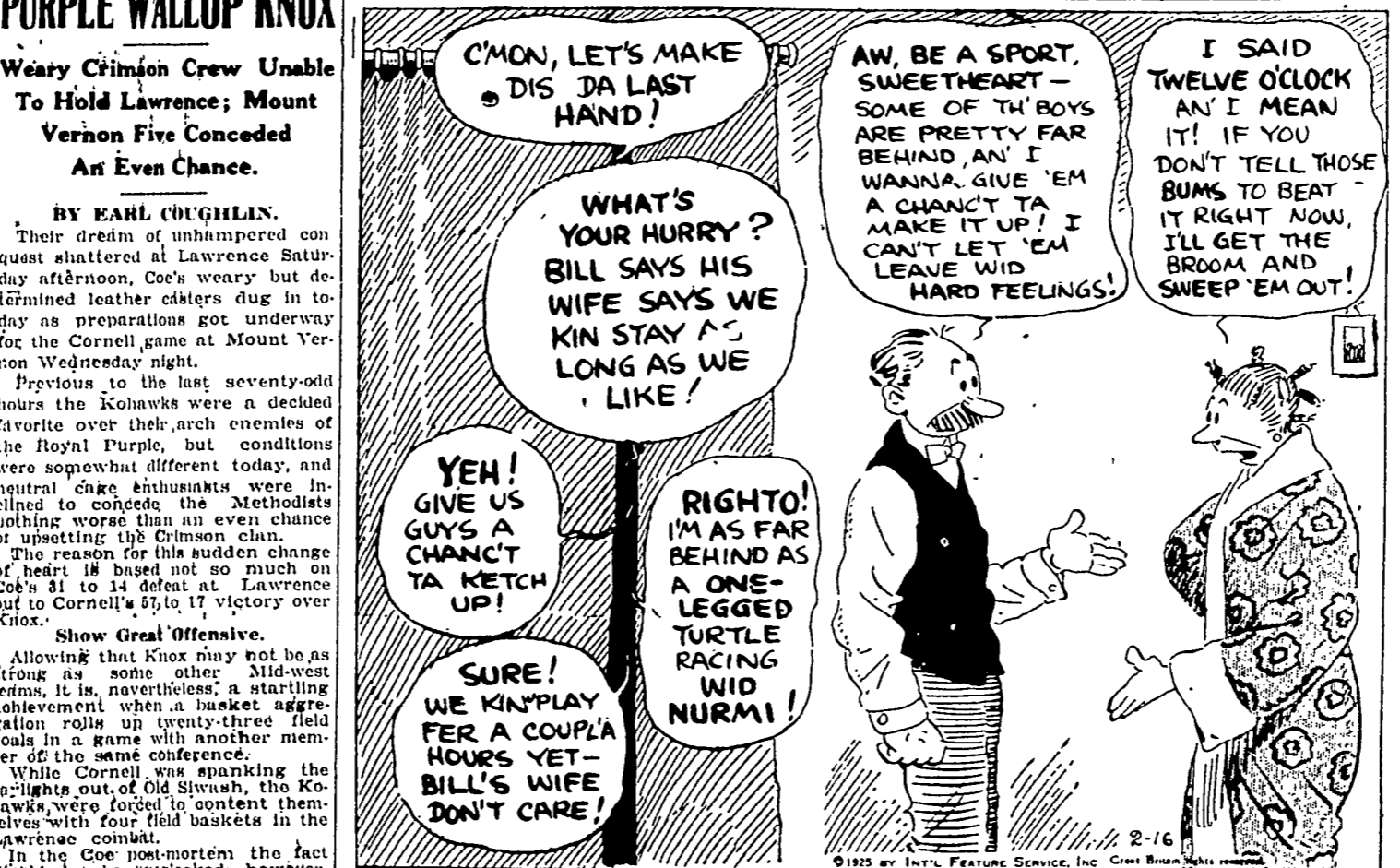
This fact also will serve to keep Nurmi in America until well into the summer, it is said.
