Legislature Split More Pronounced; Test Power Soon

DES MOINES, Feb. 16.—(By Associated Press.)—Growing indication in the state legislature that two powerful opposing factions, one known as the "economy bloc," the other as the liberal element—would develop before many days pass, was expected to come even more sharply to the fore with the resumption of legislative business today.

In the senate the lines are already visible through the action of that body on some of the matters before it last week and while the house has not yet had an opportunity to show its tenor, the impending discussion of the bill abolishing the

renewment and reform committee, already passed in the senate, and other matters are expected by the leaders to bring the division lines of the lower chamber into relief.

The senate this week is scheduled to take up the Reed bill, which would allow for confirmation of the governor's nomination with a two-thirds majority instead of two-thirds. This bill may serve to further show the division lines in the upper body and also the voting strength of the "economy bloc."
