NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Having set a precedent by launching elimination tournaments in the featherweight and lightweight classes, the New York state athletic commission plans to carry the idea into all classes of the manly art of legalized assault, even into the heavyweights.

The latter, in fact, will get immediate action, starting tomorrow, when it is understood that Tommy Gibbons and Harry Wills will be ordered to appear in the feature bout of the milk fund show to establish the logical contender in the division.

OLYMPIC STARS IN ILLINOIS CARNIVAL

Kinsey, Taylor And Hubbard Among Entrants; Others Have Made Marks.

URBANA, Ill., Feb. 23.—Thirteen stars who wore the United States shield in the Paris Olympics last summer will be among the field of 650 athletes in the eighth annual Illinois Relay Carnival here next Saturday night.

They are from Big Ten universities and of these, two are world record holders. Dan Kinsey, Illinois hurdler, who tied the best recorded time for the 75 yard high hurdles in the event of a disagreement with high hurdle champion, while DeHart Hubbard, of Michigan, in the broad jump, holds the Olympic title and the world's indoor record which he set in the carnival last year.

Four of the stars that the Missouri Valley conference sent to the Olympics will compete against their former teammates Saturday. First in prominence will be Morgan Taylor, of Grinnell, Olympic champion in the 400-meter low hurdles. Tom Poor of Kansas, who placed fourth in the high jump at Paris, will attempt to annex this year's Olympic carnival in this event.
