“ABLE M'LAUGHLINS”
CHURCH TO BE REBUILT

TRAER, March 2.—Tranquillity church southwest of Traer made famous by “The Able M'Laughlins”, the story by Margaret Wilson, former Traer girl, winner of the Harper and Pulitzer prizes, for the most representative American novel produced during the year 1923, is to be remodeled. The society recently voted to spend \$2,500 or more in improvements on its rural church building and parsonage.

The basement is to be enlarged and furnished with kitchen and dining room equipment and quarters provided for neighborhood social gatherings. The church auditorium is to be redecorated and remodeled. Electric lights are to be provided for both church and parsonage, and the buildings are to be painted. The members have pledged nearly \$2,000 to date. Three or four of the oldest members of the society have given \$500 each another \$300, and several others \$100 each. A contract for a part of the work has already been let.

Tranquillity is a Presbyterian church, founded by early Scotch settlers of the Traer community shortly after the Civil war. Before Traer was born, representatives of several of the families mentioned in the Margaret Wilson novel still are connected with the church. The Rev. J. M. Shedd is the present pastor.

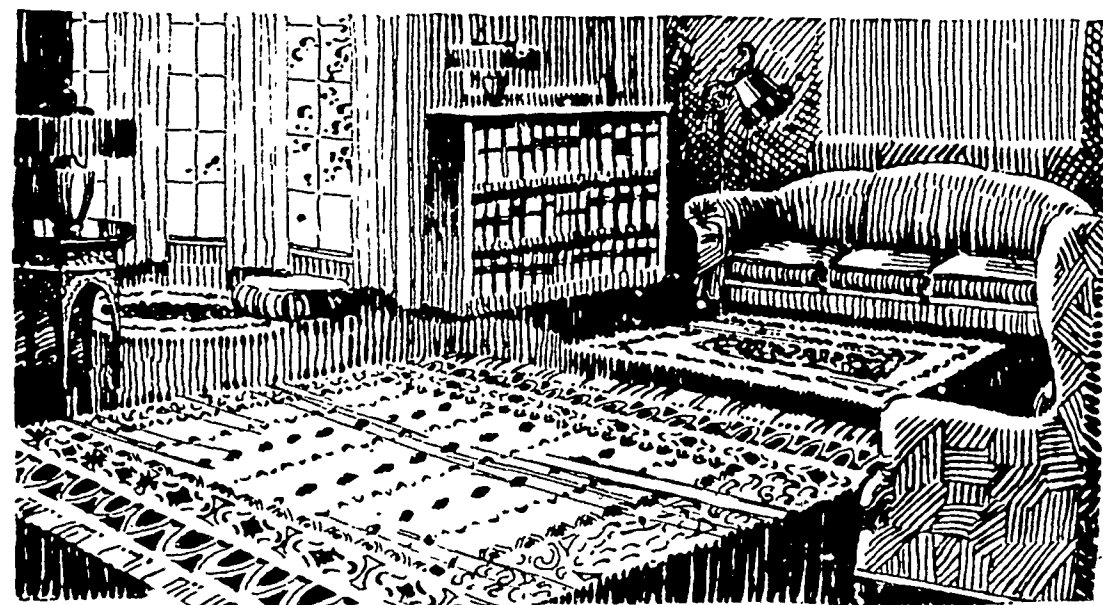
