

Cedar Rapids Not Likely To Be Awarded High School District Tourney

TIGERS AND BLAIRSTOWN WIN HONORS IN SECTIONAL MEET

Mason City Probable Site Of Northeastern Tournament; Carlsen Gleans Facts From Kline And Not Manager Brown.

THAT Mason City and not Cedar Rapids will be selected as the site of the northeastern Iowa district tournament this week-end seemed certain today when Maurice Carlsen, Washington high athletic manager, returned from Des Moines where he was in conference with George A. Brown, manager of the Iowa high school athletic association.

Carlsen said the tournament undoubtedly would be held in Mason City not so much because of anything that Brown had said, but because of facts gleaned in Mason City Saturday night after he had discussed the matter with Brown in Des Moines earlier in the day.

Kline Spilled Beans. In his conversation with Brown, Carlsen said the state official formed him that the site had not been chosen and would not be until the results of all sectional meets had been reported.

A few hours later, Leonard Kline, Mason City coach, told Carlsen that Cement City authorities had been notified that they had been awarded the meet which is one of four to be held this Friday and Saturday to decide candidates for the state championship tournament.

In the finals of the sectional tournament held at Benjamin Franklin Saturday night, the Washington Tigers and Blairstown won first prizes in their respective classes of the meet.

Tigers Given Scare. Coach Novak's basketball team were given quite a scare by Marion before they earned the right to compete in the district meet. The Red and White topped the Bengals in the quarter-finals by a three-point margin and were in a 12 to 12 deadlock at the half.

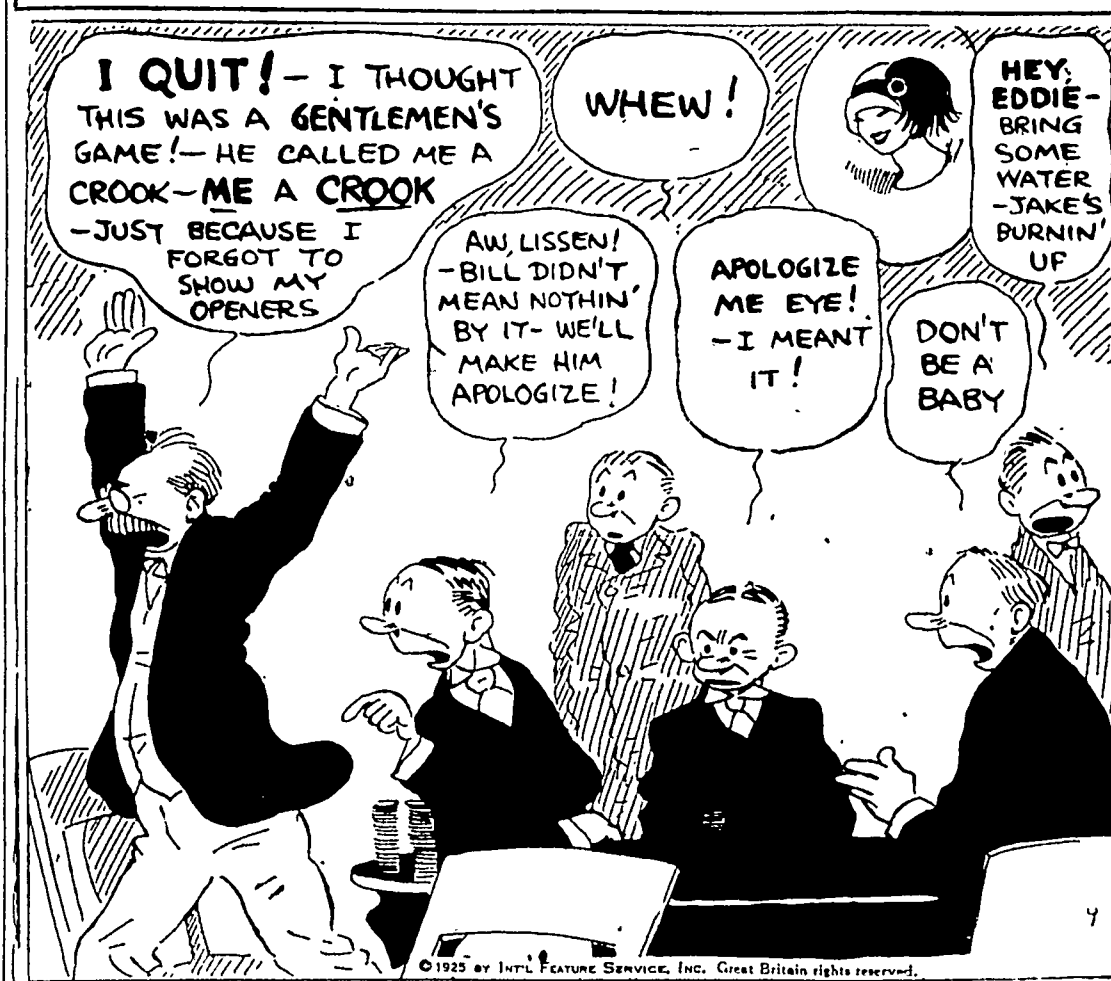

WALTHOUR TELLS HOW HE WON 6-DAY RACE

Clean Living On Advice Of His Mother Responsible For Youth's Showing.

NEWARK, N. J., March 9.—(By Universal.)—"I won the six-day bike race because I always listened to my mother's advice," Bobby Walthour, who, with Freddie Spencer, was victorious in the latest six-day grind at Madison Square Garden, declared here tonight.

"When I started in the bike game my mother said to me, 'Bobby, if you want to make good, live a good clean life' and I have done it."

"I think 'Ma Walthour' is more responsible for my success than 'Ma Strubling' is for the success of her son."

"She gave me a big kiss before the last hour of the race Saturday night and told me I had to go out and win."

"Spencer is the fastest man I ever rode with. I think Spencer is twice as fast as I. Goulet, I think he was even faster than Pete Von Kempen Saturday night, and Pete is generally looked on as the fastest man in the world on an indoor track."

Then 'Ma Walthour' stepped into the picture and insisted that she be permitted to say something about her son. She wrote what she had to say for Universal Service as follows:

"When I told Bobby to live a good clean life he followed my instructions. He is the most contented lovable son in the world and never is out after 9 o'clock. He is perfectly content to stay home at night and listen to the radio, and I think that is why he has been able to make such a record. In six races he has won three and finished second in two."

It is not the series with the Giants that the boys are kicking at. Most of these games are booked for later in the spring. Right now they do not believe they will be in shape to prove to Dixie fans that they are the world champions. Starting Tuesday the club will have only two Sundays and one Monday off before Monday, April 13, when the team will rest up in New York City before clashing with the Yankees in the opening game of the season.
