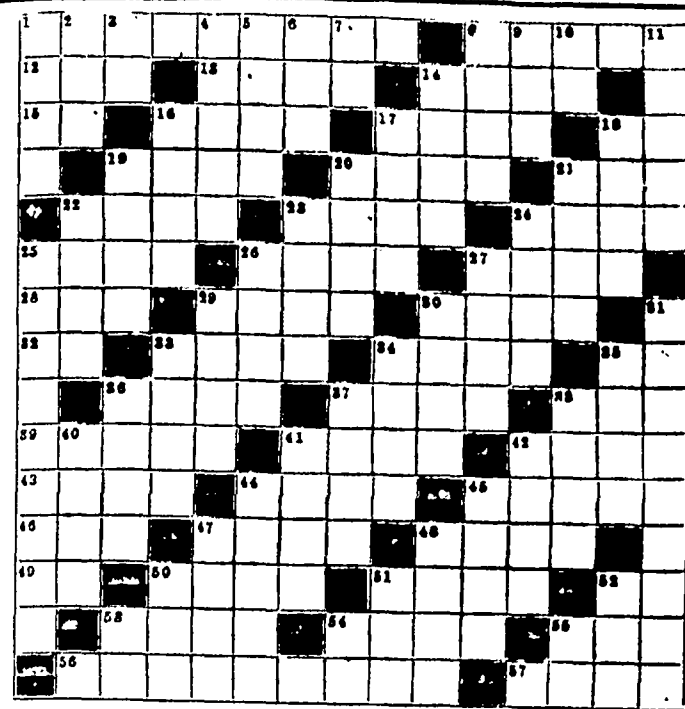

LIQUOR RAIDS NET  
FOUR OVER WEEK-END

Four arrests were made in two liquor raids by deputy sheriffs and the police Saturday night.

A party was broken up at 1227 North Fourth street west, by Deputy Sheriffs Max Avery, Larry Donovan and Roy Rudebaugh who arrested Adam Karelivsky and Charles Toloczko on charges of maintaining a liquor nuisance. On authority of a search warrant, the raiders seized a three-gallon copper still and a

gallon jug of hooch. The party so suddenly broke up, was said to be in honor of one of Karelivsky's children who was celebrating a birthday.

Yesterday both men were released on \$500 bonds, pending hearings in their cases.

After Patrolman DeVore searched a man he saw coming out of the Riverdale Inn after 2 a. m. yesterday, a raid was staged that resulted in the arrest of William and Harry Corey, also booked for maintaining a liquor nuisance. The alleged purchaser of the contraband booze had half a pint of alcohol in his pocket and when questioned is said by the police to have revealed he bought it of Harry Corey.

On searching the Coreys' rooms, a half pint of alcohol was found under a pillow and two pint bottles of the same high-powered fluid in an adjoining room.

A sequel to the arrest of the Coreys came at 6 a. m. Sunday when DeVore brought in W. J. Conway on a charge of intoxication. Conway is said to have been greatly disturbed when the two Coreys were pinched and to have advised them to say nothing. When he met Patrolman DeVore some hours later he flashed a bottle and said "now arrest me, you," says the police report.

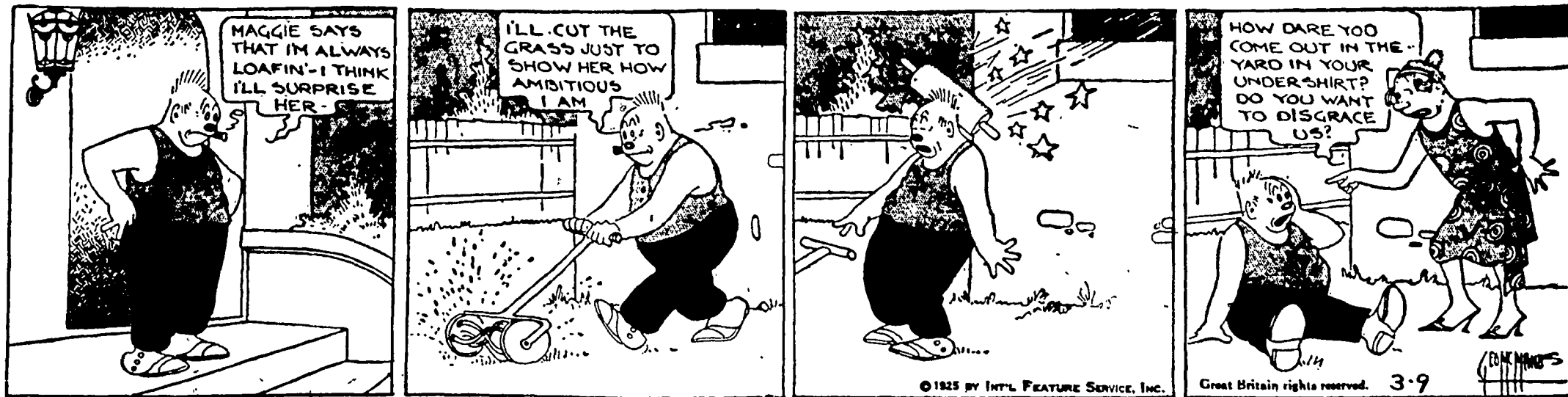
"Supplce."

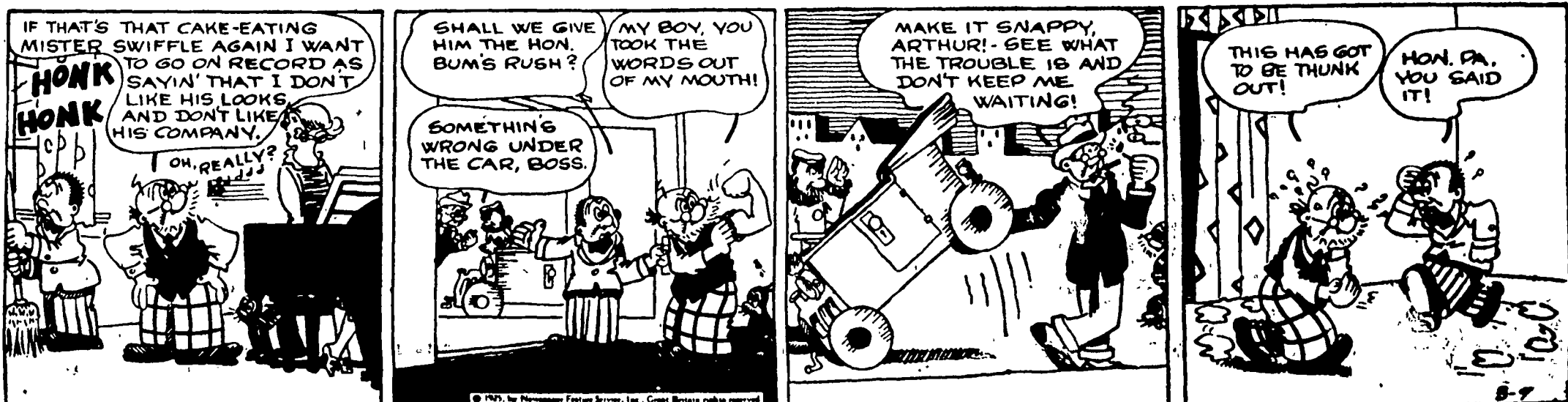

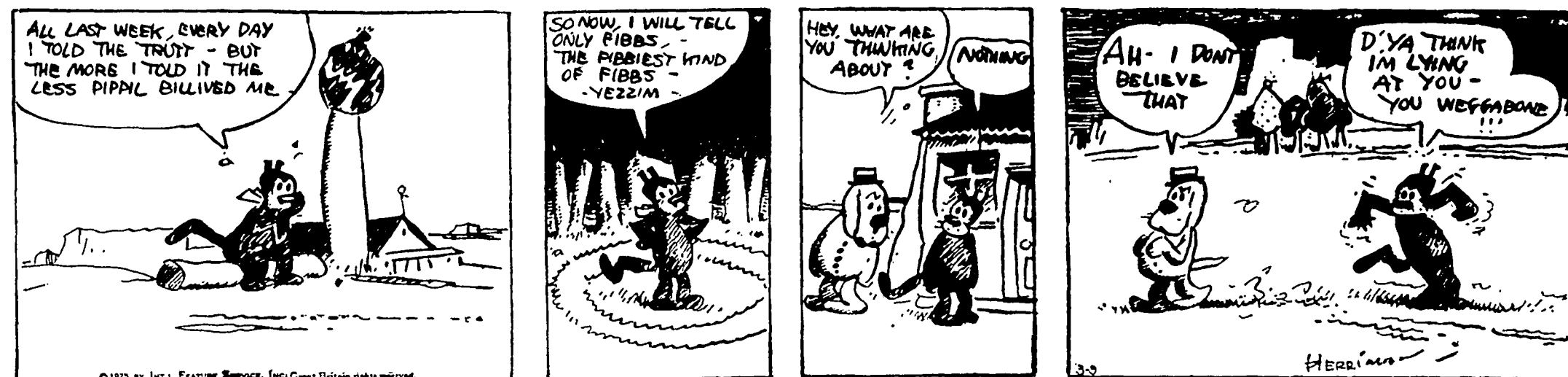
