Trains From North Late Here Due To Wreck North Of Al-

The cause of the delay was wreck several miles north of Albert Lea, Minn., where a heavy steel bridge girder on a flat car bolted eldeways and struck an embank. ment shoving the cars behind it in the ditch. No. 20 was following the freight, according to word received here.

The accident happened at 4 p. m. Saturday. All the farmers for miles around the scene of the wreck were

summoned with their teams to pull the girder from the tracks. They worked seven hours before the way was cleared. No one was injured, according to reports received here. The local train crew picked up No. 20 at Manly, and brought it to Cedar Rapids. The train arrived at 6:30 a. m. yesterday. Passenger train No. 62 was detoured over the Great Western tracks to Manly.
When the wreck was first reported here, Rock Island officials began to worry because it was just fifteen to worry because it was just litten years ago to the day that fifty-five persons were killed between Green Mountain and Gladbrook, where a Hock Island passenger train, detouring from Cedar Rapids to Waterloo over the North Western and Chicago Great Western went in the ditch
