

Tigers Add Another National Title To Long List In Northwestern Meet

INDOOR CROWN ADDED TO GRID, OUTDOOR AND BASKET TITLES

Quartet Of Novak's Youngsters Uncork A Surprise At Evanston; Windup Indoor Campaign With 1,000 Per Cent Mark.

SOME DAY in the future—near or distant—a Washington high track or football team is going to fall in the dust and be trampled on, and when that day arrives the populace will arise as one and ask, why, what in the world happened?

The day of reckoning, however, does not appear in the immediate offing. This conclusion is based on Saturday's performance in Evanston when four of Leo Novak's blue ribbon athletes annexed another national championship—so called, or otherwise—when they captured high honors in the Northwestern indoor meet.

In scoring twenty points to lick the cream of Chicago's prep stars as well as those of Peoria, Champaign and other Illinois, Iowa and Indiana schools, the squad composed of Zvacek, Stamata, Harper and Reed accomplished something that even last year's sterling team headed by Bab Cuhel could not achieve.

And Up They Jumped. Last spring's Tiger outfit of Cuhel, Healy, Cook, Moore and Butlerfield was conceded a moral smart chance of coping the indoor title, but it was forced to second place by Yale Park.

The year it was believed the in experienced Orange and Black tribe would not rank among the leaders, but by placing in seven events the quartet of youngsters maintained the pace established by Tiger title winners of other days.

In winning at Northwestern the local tracksters wound up the indoor season with a 100 per cent mark. They captured the Iowa interscholastic meet with ease won the one-mile relay at the Illinois carnival and finished in a blaze of glory at Evanston.

Archie Amons, state welterweight champion, and Al Van Ryan of St. Paul, will feature the first boxing show under auspices of the Hanford Post drum corps, according to a telegram received from Frankie Whitney today.

Whitney wires from Wausau, Wis., that he has signed the welterweight star for a ten-round bout in the auditorium on April 6. Adding that he has several preliminary fights brewing that will make up an attractive card.

Van Ryan appeared here last with John Tillman in what developed into a crowd party, but even so, there is no doubt that he is a real fighter. From the ringside it looked as though he wasn't half trying in the Tillman setto, but judging from his past performances he is capable of holding his own every minute with Amons.

Van Ryan never has been decisively beaten since attaining prominence in Detroit, and on more than one occasion he has held his own with Dago Joe Gans, generally finishing slightly in front of the Italian boy who recently handed Morio Schialer a neat licking in Davenport.

Amons, as has been said before, is now making a serious business of dealing out rights and lefts, and doubtless will make every effort to lower the colors of the Twin Citizen.

Harris Will Give Rookie Hurler An Acid Test Today

WASHINGTON, March 23.—(By Associated Press.) In selecting Jim McManis southpaw, to start for the Senators in their battle at Tampa today with the Brooklyn Dodgers, Manager Harris hoped to settle a weighty problem.

McManis has shown enough already to make him a welcome find under ordinary conditions but Manager Harris believes his pitching stuff has been so strengthened as to make it a question whether the club should pay the price asked for the Wichita southpaw. The option on him already has cost a player and \$5,000 and if he is retained the club must spend itself in two more players and \$15,000 additional. Harris was going to measure him final today against that price.

The principal bolstering the Senators have accomplished in their pitching staff looks right now to be in the acquisition of Ruether the former Dodger who came to Washington.

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DEMPSEY MAY JOIN WALKER AND M'TIGUE ON THE INELIGIBLE LIST

Commission Likely To Suspend Champion For Failure To Accept Will's Challenge.

NEW YORK, March 23.—(By International News.)—Jack Dempsey probably will be placed on the New York State Athletic commission's ineligible list tomorrow because of his failure to accept the challenge of Harry Wills, it was indicated today. The commission's action will be taken after waiting fifteen days for the heavyweight champion to answer the defi of the Negro challenger.

If Dempsey is placed under the ban he will have company in Mickey Walker and Mike McTigue, respectively welterweight and light-heavyweight champions, who likewise have been barred here because they declined to accept matches from challengers recognized by the board.

Meanwhile smaller continues to obscure the vision concerning a match between Harry Wills and Tommy Gibbons. The St. Paul man is said to have demanded something like \$200,000 to clash with Wills while the Negro, or perhaps his manager, Raddy Mullins declines to say much about the proposed engagement, financially or otherwise.

The opinion is steadily gaining strength that Jack Kearns does not propose to pit himself against Wills. The first mingling with Gibbons and when Wills' guardian angel fully realizes the significance of this, he will croak his fingers around a pep and affix his signature on the dotted line.

Butler Or Davis May Break In At Shortstop; Ash Is Best Looking Of Young Pitchers; No Telling Where Club Will Finish.

SHREVEPORT, La., March 23.—A new team spirit, some new hopefuls working out in the short field, and a feeling that as long as the rest of the league knows they don't belong in last place something should be done about it—that's the Chicago White Sox says Eddie Collins, manager. It would be a most reckless prophet who would dare to say how high this club will go, or, for that matter, how high it will not go.

As the shortstop problem is, as usual, chief among the White Sox worries, let's look it over at once.

Leading candidate at the moment is Johnny Butler, who as far back as 1916, was something more than a raw recruit with Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast league. If knowledge of what it is all about, and experience in a variety of things, and an indifferent minor leagues, is of any help, Butler should do well.

After Butler, and in regular order, comes Ike Davis, from Columbus, and Harvey McClellan, who isn't getting so much attention now, but who will very likely go to short, as in the past, when all the spring flowers have faded and gone. Still, Butler may be the shortstop the Sox are looking for.

Vets on Infield.
The rest of the Sox infield, will be Earl Sheeley, Collins himself, and Willie Kamm, with John Clancy understudying Sheeley.

The outfield remains unchanged, though Spencer Harris, a rookie from Bay City is doing well, and Johnny Mostil threatens to have the big year that must be due him, sooner or later. Bib Falk and Harry Hooper will help out all they can. In fact, a reformed shortstop, who has turned square, and returned to the outfield, will be retained. Maurice Arpdeacon and Roy Elsh are also company but so far have shown no signs of chasing Mostil, Falk, Hooper, and Barrett out of the camp.

Kenneth Ash, a big right hander from Rocky Mount, in the Virginia league, is about all there is in recruit pitching sensation here this spring.
