## EDDIE KANE SPEEDING EAST TO GET BOUT FOR GIBBONS

Wills' Manager Promises To Break Silence Wednesday; Big Money Looms For Tom In Match With Negro; He's Ready.

NEW YORK, March 30.—That the promised showdown in the heavyweight situation will develop within the next forty-eight hours was forecast today by the fact that Eddie Kane, man of business for Tom Gibbons, was speeding east toward a final rendezvous with local promoters, while Paddy Mullins, manager of Harry Wills, was re-affirming his promise to come out of the silence by Wednesday.

## Manager Collins Hands Pink Slips To Two Pitchers

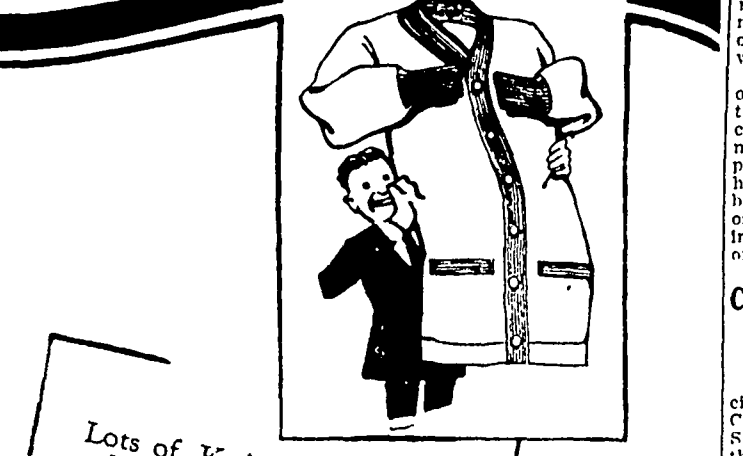
CHICAGO, March 30.—The axe fell in the White Sox training camp at Shreveport, La., yesterday when manager Eddie Collins announced that Happy Gus Foreman has been released outright to the Beaumont, Texas, club and Milton Steingrabe to the Shreveport club. The latter's release was on option, indicating that he may be tried out again next spring. The release of Steingrabe and Foreman reduces the pitching staff to eleven. At least two more will have to go, and possibly three, but it is not regarded as probable that the staff will be reduced to eight men before May 15.

Kane also got in his work on the coast and prevented a game between the Cubs and Angels at Los Angeles. The Cubs left last night for a couple of games with Sacramento, "Rabbit" Marunville and Denver Grigsby were left behind, the former to keep the latter company, and to have the cast on his injured ankle renewed every three days. Grigsby was operated on yesterday and was reported as doing well.

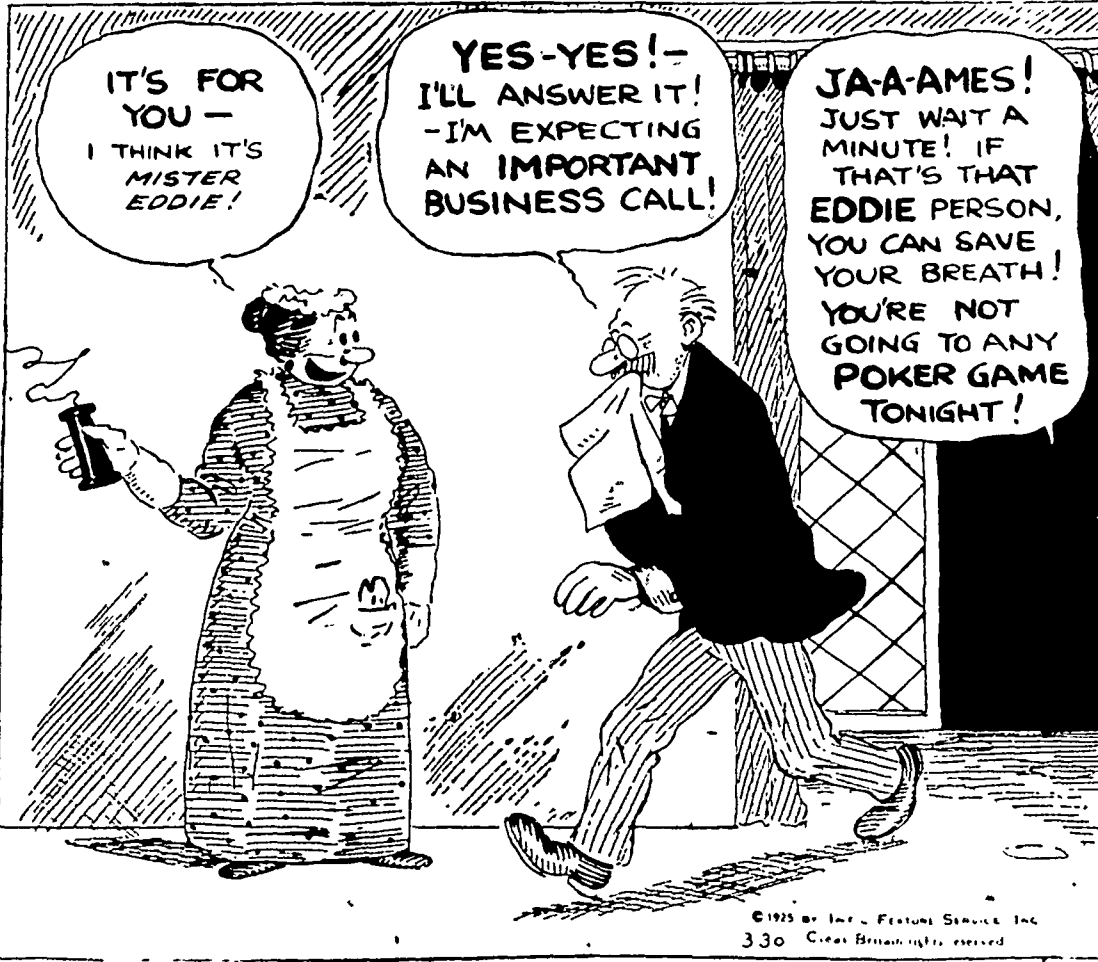

## NOTED AMATEUR STAR DEAD IN ST. PAUL

Campbell, 77, formerly of Milwaukee, who gained distinction many years ago in amateur athletic competition in the northwest, died at his home here yesterday. His friends said that a heart attack caused his death. He was the old Chelonia, who, at forty years ago, has never been broken under the former times. Campbell was a charter member of the Milwaukee Turnverein and in 1880 he served as captain of the Sheridan guards in Milwaukee. A widow, three daughters and two sons survive.

## DAUBER HAS GREAT SHOT PUT RECORD

Junior Star Banishes Provincial Weakness Of Iowa In That Event; May Go Better This Spring.

IOWA CITY, March 30.—The proverbial weakness of the Iowa track team in the shot put has not been present for the last two years since the advent of Ray Dauber of Iowa City. For Dauber, now competing as a junior, has shown an improvement of 3 feet 8 inches over his best mark registered as a freshman in 1923. That year he heaved the lead 41 feet, 9 1/2 inches to shatter the university record, which had stood since 1920; so far this year he has been credited with 45 feet, 5 1/2 inches.

## DAUBER HAS GREAT SHOT PUT RECORD

Dauber has competed in thirteen meets since his intercollegiate career started. He has been first six times, second twice, third four times and fourth once. First place in five of six dual meets has gone to the Iowa. The name of Dauber appears in the summer of almost any big meet in which he competes, for last year he was third at both the conference indoor and outdoor affairs, third at the special event at the Drake relay and fourth at the state meet. He also won the sectional trials for the Olympic team held at Iowa City but did not go east for the final trials. His high mark of 1924 was 45 feet, 5 1/2 inches.

This winter the Hawkeye won the Wisconsin dual, beating the renowned Schwarze, and was easily first in the Illinois dual with his record heave of 45 feet, 5 1/2 inches. He took third at the Illinois dual, trailing Schwarze and Hutchinson, of Missouri, and making his poorest punt of the year, an effort of 44 feet, 9 inches. At the indoor conference two weeks ago Dauber was beaten only by Schwarze and got the lead over 45 feet, 2 inches—far enough to have won the event in eleven of the fourteen meets which have been held.
