Corking Good Story.

"Frivolous Sal" in which Eugene O'Brien, Mae Busch and Benny Alexander are featured at the Palace this week, is a good all-around picture with one whiz of a thrill where a man on horseback tries to jump across a canyon—and he doesn't succeed! The story takes a hop, skip and a jump from Broadway to the great west. In the first scene you see a little boy whose mother has just died, and the boy's father, an actor, who has just signed a contract to play an engagement in the west. It is in this scene that Benny Alexander does his best work. Mae Thorne says he doesn't play his role; he lives it.

When the father goes west, he meets Sal, a rich orphan and the pet of the mining community. He tells her of his son and fails to write the boy that he has a new mother. On the wedding night Sal meets the boy just as he is about to leave on her wedding. The honeymoon is called off while Sal waits for the boy. Her husband becomes drunk and gambler. Benjie tries to be a gentleman, but he hotly resents his father's reform and Benjie's place. At the end of the trail the father is reformed and Benjie learns to love his mother. O'Brien plays the role of the lover and measures up to it. Mae Busch is Sal. She is good in the role she plays, and this is one of her best. The rest of the cast is excellent.

The Screen Today

STRAND—Red-blooded romance and drama best describe "As Man Desires," in which Milton Sills and Viola Dana are being featured at the Strand. It is a story of the south seas and British India with Sills playing the role of a British army surgeon and the swashbuckling captain of a pearl fisher. His characterization of both roles may easily be checked among the best things he has done in recent years. Miss Dana is charming and bewitching in the role of the Tahitian dancing girl. In some respects the story is like "Rain," but it contains more drama and more heart appeal. The hero is accused of a murder by a woman he despises. He leaves India and goes to Tahiti where he meets the dancing girl. They fall in love and are married. The complications that ensue indeed are amazing and the finale is astonishing. There are many dramatic moments in the story including one of the best fist fights that has been filmed in a long time. The scenic effects are well done. Other features. Final times Wednesday night.

ISIS—"The Tenth Woman" which is the feature of the Isis this week, is a production that can be included in the class of the unexcelled. It is a delightful romance of an out-of-the-way woman. It tells what happened to a woman who wanted everything—and things were hers. She was the tenth. The entire production has that finished touch throughout, that fineness of construction which gives it distinction. Even if the picture had nothing more to recommend it, it would be worth seeing because of the unusual combination of stars. June Marlowe who shares stellar honors with Beverly Bayne, although young, is one of the most promising stars on the screen today. Beverly Bayne is as charming

ing as ever even though she has not been in the limelight for a good many years. Others who give notable characterizations are John Roche, Raymond McKee, Charles "Buddy" Post, Gilbert Holmes, Alec Francis, and Edith Yorke.

The story is excellent and it is handled with deft touches of originality, and is cleverly arranged in detail. "The Fiddler's Doll," one of the new Fast Steppers stories, is offered on the same bill. It is a thriller and the races are fascinating and exciting. Aesop's Fables and news are added.

RIALTO—Now and then comes along one of those films of which it seems reasonable to say to every one, "You can't afford to miss it." And that, as this reviewer believes, is most certainly the case with the Hobart Henley production "So This is Marriage," at the Rialto. This picture from the original story by Carey Wilson, is an ultra-modern one, dealing with the marital difficulties of Peter Marsh (Conrad Nagel) and Beth Marsh (Eleanor Boardman), and the influence of the bachelor student of books—and women—Daniel Rankin (Lew Cody). The young wife is gay and frivolous. When Peter mildly protests against her extravagance, she retorts: "Why don't you earn more money; other men do!" She finds comfort in the company of Daniel Rankin, and runs to his home for comfort when her husband has treated her roughly after hastily taking her from a restaurant where, after many previous explanations, she has been harshly criticized for her extreme manner of dress, and her irresponsible ways.

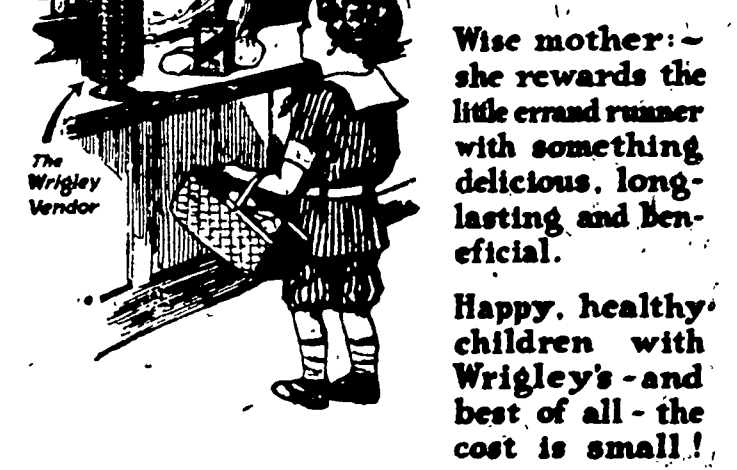
