Local theatergoers who filled the  
Majestic last night were delighted  
with the return of the Sherman  
Stock company. The audience shook  
hands figuratively with old friends  
in the company who were here last  
summer, and extended a cordial wel-  
come to the new members, who, by  
their performance last night made a  
place for themselves in the esteem  
of the theater's patrons.

As George Donahue, manager of the  
company, introduced each one  
across the footlights and there were  
bouquets for Louise Sherwood, the  
new leading woman of the company,  
and Violet LeClaire, one of the most  
popular members of the company.  
It seemed like a happy home coming  
to have Marie Davidson, Arthur  
Hayes, George Donahue, Grace Ed-  
wards and Miss LeClaire again in  
the Majestic while the company  
E. B. Harrington, the leading man  
Miss Sherwood, Harry Sobier doing  
a heavy, 12 G. Peters the juve-  
nile and Wanda Wardo and Harry  
Vickers in all the roles all gave  
a good account of themselves, and  
we predict will do their part in  
maintaining the high record of tal-  
ent and popularity which the Sher-  
man company enjoyed last season here.

"The Best People" one of Avery  
Hopwood's biggest hits, is the play  
for this week and it was a happy  
choice as an opener for the season.  
It is a hilarious farce with a laugh  
in nearly every line, yet it deals  
with a vital problem of today—the  
revolt of the children of the so-called  
"best people" who think they have  
given their children everything  
when they give them all the money  
to spend they want.

There's nothing dull in the play  
and the Sherman players handle it  
with consummate skill, bringing out  
every delightful situation, every play  
of character against character and  
the laugh provoking "kick" in the  
lines.

Miss Sherwood, charming and  
sincere, gave an excellent reading  
to the part of the rebellious daugh-  
ter of the Bronson Lennox's Mr.  
Harrington, while not having such a  
heavy part, in the role of the chau-  
vinist father, as he may have in suc-  
ceeding plays, did it well and gave  
hints of deeper dramatic power.

To Harry Sobier and Miss Le-  
Claire—Harry as the family worship-  
ing uncle who thinks it's all "so  
horrible," and Miss LeClaire as the  
chorus girl, hard boiled but square  
are due most of the comedy honors.  
In the character of Millie of the  
chorus, Mr. Hopwood provided one  
of the funniest roles on the stage  
and Miss LeClaire makes the best  
of it but yet does not overdo it.

Donahue is the unlucky Lord  
Rockmore, who is told to "beat it,"  
who plays the bill, who is the inn-  
cent bystander and the helping  
friend, who in such a role adds more  
fun for the audience in this first of  
laughs.

Miss Davidson is entirely equal  
to the part of the hysterical old  
cunt bear it. Mrs. Lennox who has  
set her heart on a title in the fun-  
ny Arthur has the same fun-  
stage appearance and manner, the  
same poise and pleasing "manicure"  
as of yore. If not more so, and as  
Bronson Lennox maintains the  
equilibrium of the family and finally  
comes to the conclusion that some  
new blood in it will not be amiss.

The complications began when  
Bertie Lennox (G. Peters) falls  
for Allen O'Neil, a chorus dancer  
(Grace Edwards) who proves her-  
self to be the one to "keep him  
straight." To tell you how it all  
works out for a happy ending would  
be going too far. It provides a  
pleasant, exciting entertainment  
and a lighter, you know, is de-  
sired for a winter's rest. Better try

PALACE—An Ibanex story with

taining manner. The star wears a  
number of "hats" and costumes.

RIALTO—Teeth, the latest star-  
ing vehicle of Tom Mix, with Tony  
the horse and Luke the dog, was  
adapted from the popular novel  
"Sonny" written by Virginia Hud-  
son Brightman, a former well-  
known newspaper woman and Cin-  
ton 11 Stage.

In the original story, "Sonny" is  
an Airplane that has many hair-  
breadth escapes. The book is de-  
scribed by its publisher as "a dog  
story, a love story and a western  
story." In the screen version, the  
sequence and incidents have been  
slightly changed to allow greater

ISIS—Laughing lightning. That's  
Douglas MacLean in "Introduce  
Me" now playing at the Isis. It is  
far superior to anything this young  
star has ever given to the

friend, a trick exploding cigar, a  
case of mistaken identity, the high-

WATER CONSUMERS PAID  
\$163,273 LAST YEAR

Cedar Rapids water consumers  
paid a total of \$163,273.32 in water  
rentals during the year ending  
March 31, the annual report of the  
city water works submitted to Fi-  
nance Commission. Both shows  
other receipts were \$4,007.50 for serv-  
ice connections and \$13,810.84 for  
sewerage service.

The expenditures under the gen-  
eral account total \$116,875.61, the  
largest items of which were \$53,  
\$19.44 for operating salaries, \$21,  
\$26.94 for interest on bonds and \$15,  
\$67.41 for fuel.

Outlay for permanent improve-  
ments amounted to \$21,679.45,  
the largest single item in this list. It  
includes \$20,000 in retirement of bonds  
and \$1,679.45 for extensions and repairs  
of the main line and \$1,997.45 for  
other construction work.

Beautiful Fantasy Delights  
Large Audience On Its  
First Showing At The  
Strand Sunday.

That wonderful ecstatic laughter,  
tinkling and beautiful, just the  
laughter that Barrie loves to hear,  
greeted the pictureized version of  
"Peter Pan" at the Strand yesterday.  
Again and again the silence of the  
audience was snapped by the ring-  
ing laugh of a single boy which was  
quickly followed by an outburst from  
dozens of others, some of whom  
shook in their seats in sheer joy at  
what they saw on the screen. It  
was the laughter that reminded one

way to Never-Never Land. They en-  
joyed seeing Nana give Michael his  
medicine and they were agitated when  
Mr. Darling in the most cowardly  
way poured his nasty medicine into  
the faithful Nana's bowl. And great  
was the chagrin when Nana was  
taken outside in the cold.

This picture is not a movie, but a  
theatrical masterpiece. The producer  
has not strayed from the theme of  
the whimsical story. In Never-Nev-  
er Land mermaids are seen by the  
sum-it sea and when the redoubtable

Hugh Ford.

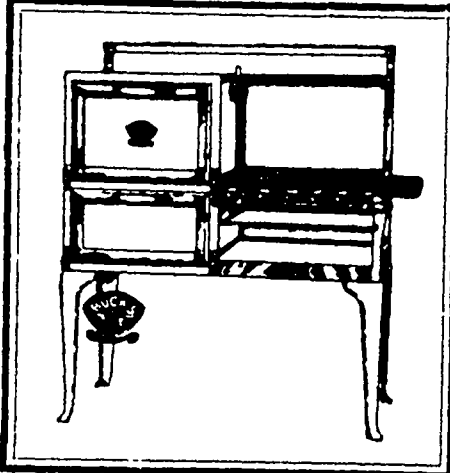

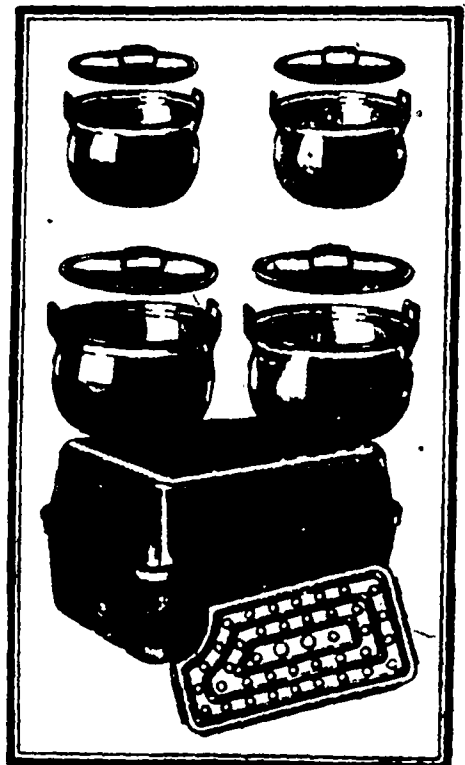
