Announcement was made today at the Iowa Masonic Library of the gift by Mrs. H. F. Milligan of 600 books from the library of her husband, the Rev. Henry F. Milligan, who was pastor of the Congregational church. Dr. Milligan, who was a past grand prelate of the Grand Commandery of Iowa, and active in Masonic circles generally, was a frequent visitor at the Masonic library and spent many hours among the volumes with which his library will be placed.

Commenting on the addition to the library, Dr. H. F. Milligan, grand secretary and librarian, said: "The generous donation from Mrs. Milligan is a very desirable acquisition to the extensive theological collection now available to Cedar Rapids residents at the Iowa Masonic Library. Dr. Milligan's library, consisting chiefly of books on modern theology and liberal Christianity, supplements the recent donation of 1,500 volumes from the library of Dr. Burkhalter. Recent publications of the religious book houses of the George H. Doran company, Fleming and Revell and others are to be found among the volumes just acquired. They are especially valuable because they appeal to the intelligent layman interested in the religious problems of the day, and the problems confronting modern civilization. Such readers will find the single volume collections of liberal sermons and scholarly essays of particular interest."
