COE, WASHINGTON AND GRANT RELAY RUNNERS KEPT IN TRIM

Coach Monilaw Undecided Which Teams He Will Enter; McPartland's Pastimers Return After Losing Two Of Three Games.

TRACK athletes of Coe, Washington and Grant as well as the Kohawk diamond pastimers, will face strenuous afternoons for the next few days preparing for important engagements in the immediate offing.

The respective thinned aggregations will do their stuff by way of fitting them for the Drake classic at Des Moines this week end. Each of the local schools will be well represented at the annual event although the manner of their appearances still is somewhat clouded.

Coach Bryant's Crimson squad stopped out briskly Saturday to win a close meet with the State Teachers while Grant fairly ran away with Shelburne and Mount Vernon in a triangular meet. The Kohawks were handicapped by the loss of Leo Loftus, crack sprinter and quarter-mileer, but he will be in shape for Saturday's meet.

Grant May Enter Two. Coach Monilaw is undecided what boys he will carry to Des Moines, but expects to arrive at a decision after today's tryouts. The west side mentor intimated last week that he would send teams to the marks in the quarter and half-mile events. He has a number of promising sprinters, among them being Kucera and Malacek, both of whom showed good form in Saturday's meet.

Fritz McPartland's performers will attempt to iron out a few kinks before launching the Mid-west conference campaign. The Kohawks were bested in two of three games last week, losing by one run margins to Luther and Dubuque and winning from Upper Iowa. HOPKINTOWN, Mass., April 20.—(By International News.)—Half an inch of snow and sleet covered the countryside and a slashing gale swept down from the northeast today as 121 running stars of the country gathered here for the start of a twenty-ninth annual Boston Athletic Association Marathon classic.

The winner of today's race from this town to Boston will be crowned "champion marathoner of the United States," the Amateur Athletic association having decided there should be championship at the marathon distance.

Clarence De Mar, the latter veteran marathon runner, four times winner of the classic, was the favorite to win the national title today. The distance of the course was 26 miles, 385 yards. It was estimated that 200,000 persons would witness the grind.

Stanford Winner Over California In Close Battle

PALO ALTO, Cal., April 19.—(By Associated Press.)—"Halfbreed Harry" could not have devised a more exciting event than the dual track and field meet in which Stanford defeated California by two points here Saturday.

The score—Stanford 66 1/2, California 64 1/2—was arrived at as the result of the final event, the relay race, which provided a series of speed thrills. To Richardson of Stanford goes the credit for victory in that deciding event.

Up to the relay it was nip-and-tuck. One team would gain an advantage which the other would wipe out promptly. At the first of the meet Stanford swung into a good lead but failed to maintain it, and several times California was ahead. The Berkeley Bears led by three points with all events completed except the relay.

The races brought out four new Stanford-California records, which meant that they were better than the "big meet" have produced since the two universities started them in 1893. These were as follows: Miller (Stanford) won the quarter mile in 1:45.1.5. Lelander (Stanford) took the high hurdles in 14.9.10. Stevens (California) the two-mile in 9:45.3.10. and Boyden (California) the half-mile in 1:54.1.10.

Intercollegiate records. About the only existing record that appears beyond reach of a human is the 100 yard dash: The mark of .39.35 for the century has stood for years, and probably will stand for many more.

It was learned today. Paddock ran 175 meters in 18.45 seconds, while Murchison covered 120 meters in 13.10. It is considered likely, however, that the A. A. U. may not recognize these records because a strong wind aided the runners.
