APPROXIMATELY 50 FARMERS APPLY IT ON CORN GROUND

Treatment Increases Yields On Some Soils, Fails To On Others; Kraft Farm Shows Its Possibilities Where Needed.

NORTHERN Linn and southern Buchanan county farmers are probably using more commercial fertilizer on their corn land than those of any similar area in eastern lowa. Last year approximately fifty men tried this method of increasing yields and hastening the maturity of the crop-

Introduced on a few farms of the community approximately five years ago the use of fertilizer has grown rapidly until it has already passed the experimental stage on many fields. Several men are trying it for the first time this year following good results obtained by their neighbors in the slow backward senson of last year.

Soil varies considerably from one farm to another and even on the same farm. The soil specialists at Ames say the best way to know whether fertilizer will help a certain crop on a certain farm is to actually try a small amount of it on a limited acreage. Good results might be obtained at the control of the


