Crash Victim Out Of Hospital; Two Teachers Better

Harl Russell of Marshalltown, student at the University of Iowa, who was one of the nine persons injured last Tuesday when the automobile driven by Harold C. Andrews crashed into a crowd of folk waiting for a street car, was released from St. Luke's hospital Sunday night.

Miss Audrey Burns and Miss Helen Cornwell, teachers in the Belle Plaine schools, are the only persons left in the local hospital now as a result of the accident. Although they suffered severe fractures, their condition is said to be improving.

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
