If you don't get a laugh and a kick out of this week's show at the Majestic, then those who prescribed laughter as a tonic for life have the wrong dose.

"The Girl in the Limousine" as played by the Sherman Stock company, kept two audiences in giggles and roars of laughter yesterday.

This farce written by Avery Hopwood is in many ways, much daintier, lighter and more situations, than while improbable, are nevertheless highly comical from the standpoint of a well-fed audience.

Just imagine a young man being robbed of clothes and money and knocked unconscious, only to find himself in the boudoir of the pretty young married woman, who, before her vows was a favorite sweetheart of his.

He steals the woman's dressing gown and complications begin. The mysterious disappearance of the gown, causes all kinds of conjectures which are increased as various members of the household get glimpses of a fleeting form rolling under the bed, and dashing for some other room.

Of course, the young husband has to go to a directors' meeting and soon afterward the plot thickens as Aunt Artie, a health eccentric arrives from the Alps, and she discovers the harassed hero when he emits a sneeze and jumps at the conclusion that he is the husband of her niece. Much to the amusement of the audience, she insists on packing them off to bed with hot flatirons and onion poultices.

The climax is reached when one by one, the household discovers who the mysterious stranger really is. E. B. Harrington is the luckless motorist who is waylaid and finds himself, sans wardrobe, in the home of his former sweetheart, only to be kept jumping from one hiding place or one explanation to another. It is handled right by Harrington and thus does not fall into the pit of monotony or the hokum of slapstick.

None of the roles requires the dramatic power displayed in "Smilin' Through", but rather a speedy handling of one situation after another to prevent the interest from lagging.

Miss Sherwood is gay and charming, while Marie Davidson as her aunt gives a good characterization of a woman who has positive ideas of her own, jumps at conclusions and issues orders with the expectation, out of long experience, that they will be obeyed.

H. C. Souther who won praise for acting in last week's production, exhibits a new ability as comedian, in the role of Riggs, the butler. His appearance and speech were always good for laughs.

Arthur Hayes, as the doctor who becomes so tendered that he thinks his own wife is a doctor, adds to the laughs. He's usually in a heavy dramatic or character role.—J. R. B.

## FACULTY GIVES \$50,000 TOWARD MEMORIAL UNION

IOWA CITY, May 11.—Construction of the \$1,000,000 Memorial Union building at the University of Iowa was given impetus yesterday with the announcement that the Triangle club, an organization comprised of 250 men on the university faculty, had voted \$50,000 toward the construction of a second unit of the building, provided quarters in this unit are assigned the club and plans submitted by the organization are adopted.

The first unit of the structure is now being built. The second unit called for in the plans of the Triangle club would be of the same general style, and construction work would begin this summer. It is believed that the gift of the Triangle club will be accepted in conformance with its plans. The club asks to occupy one and one-half floors of the three story unit, increasing by 70 per cent the facilities of their present quarters and relieving the crowded conditions with which the organization is faced on the occasion of reunions and similar meetings. Financing of the \$50,000 fund will probably be carried out through the sale of bonds to the 250 club members.
