Explains Shipper's Returns.

Complaints of shippers over their returns can usually be explained quickly by a glance at the record sheet. Practically any question can be answered from the books.

Chiengo Cedur Rapids and Ottuniwa Now eight markets are in use, each getting the grade of hogs on which they are paying best prices during a certain period. The managers know in detail what it costs to ship to each of these markets and consequently are able to play them to the advantage of their patrons.

'As a rule," says the report, "the more shoots grown the more potations of these there will be to set. Often two or three times as many potatoes set on a frosted plant as can possibly mature. This of course makes small potatoes many of which may be un marketable. In small home gardens, it might be advisable to plant later potatoes such as Rural New Yorker between the rows of the early frost ed potatoes. These should be planted immediately.

Many Bugs Coming.

It has been noted that the potato bugs which wintered over from last year are already beginning to lay segs on the under side of the potatoe leaf. Myriads of young potato bugs will soon hatch from these eggs and it is important that they be controlled by spraying with some ars senical spray."


