While the general who led the American army expedition into Mexico and the present chief of the United States marines were enjoying a week-end trip with President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg on the Mayflower, President Calles of Mexico called Mr. Kellogg a prevaricator and told Uncle Sam to go to. And that is a pretty mess.

Three days ago the state department sent Mexico a warning signed by Secretary Kellogg. It rather forcefully indicated that this country has grown tired of Mexico's failure to protect American lives and property, and it frankly stated that if the southern "republic" desired to retain our friendship and support it would have to prove its right to them by demonstrating some friend ship on its own account.

Yesterday came a reply from Pres ident Calles. It was brief, arrogant and insulting. It puts the state department plainly on the defensive It tells us that if we do not like Mexico's way of doing business, we can lump it. It informs Secretary Kellogg that he didn't know what he was talking about, and that he contradicted himself. It is quite a remarkable document. Illinois Central Limited Train Marooned; Passengers May Be In Danger; Persons Rescued From Roofs Of Houses; Maquoketa River Has Risen Twenty Feet In Few Hours; Other Streams Out Of Banks.

(BY LONG DISTANCE PHONE.)

MANCHESTER, June 15.-Following a cloudburst between nidnight and 6 a. m., which swelled the Maquoketa river and forced it over its banks, Manchester and surrounding country was flooded today, causing loss in stock and property which is expected to run above \$500,000. There was one fatality.

Mrs. Coles of Colesburg, was drowned when her home was surrounded by water. She succeeded in saving her two sons but was washed away by the raging torrent. Her body has not been recovered.

Nearly one-third of Manchester was under water at noon. In the southwest section of the business district the water is between ten and twelve feet deep. Stores and plants are flooded. Lights are out. The high tension line to Cedar Rapids is out of order. The water plant is submerged and it is feared the drinking water will become contaminated.

A two story building of the Hennessey taxi service company and housing the Knights of Columbus hall, collapsed when its concrete foundation was whirled into the swishing floodwater.
