



CHICAGO.-Calvin Demarest, wh CHICAGO.—Calvin Demarest, who is 1907 and 1908 won the national and international amateur balk-line billiard championships, and in his day one of the best known players in the world, died Friday, June 12 He will be buried today from Logan chapel, 425 East Sixty-(Irst street at 10 a m. Interment will be in Memorial Park cemetery at Evanston. Demarest was born in Chicago. June 20, 1886 After leaving school he was a clerk on the Chicago Board of Trade for seven years. He statted of Trade for seven years. He started playing billiards when 14 years of age and in 1905 made his first ap-
